- That the purchase of Brendan Lee Satish Tang's, *Attempts to Contain Evil* (Manga Ormolu Version 4.1b), 2011, ceramics and mixed media, 50.8 cm x 24.1 cm x 20.3 cm be approved, for \$16,800 (includes 12% tax and museum discount).

The event will possibly be held at the Gallery.</li> <li>Volunteer Update</li> <li>There were 154 volunteers involved in the Gallery's public programs in 2024, which is the equivalent of 2.3 full time employees or 4,134 hours of work.</li> <li>There are 2 additional volunteers that contributed 24 hours assisting with fundraising and event delivery.</li> <li>Wallace Joyce Scholarship</li> <li>The 2024 scholarship was awarded to Angel Zheng from G.W. Ms. Leclair spoke about the Development Officer splitting her time

#### **VARLEY ART GALLERY 2025 REQUEST TO THE FOUNDATION**

At the January 13, 2025 meeting of the board I attached a request for support in the amount of \$40,000. Following discussion at that time, it was suggested that I revise the operational support portion of the request upwards. Attached to my report is a request to the Varley-McKay Art Foundation of Markham for 2025 support in the amount of \$50,000. As previously noted, the support is for activities which align with those outlined in the 2006 MOU between the City of Markham and the Varley-McKay Art Foundation of Markham. The funds would be allocated as outlined in the chart below.

1. Education	For the virtual Lunch and Learn Program	\$5,000
2. Exhibitions	For seven exhibitions across three exhibition rotations	\$12,000

#### **GRANTS**

Since the Meeting of January 13, we completed an application to the 2025 round of the Ontario Seniors Community Grant Program, submitted on January 16. This year the application was for a grant to support activities at the both the Varley Art Gallery and the Markham Museum. Our asks were combined into one, as the province will accept only one application per organization, and as departments/facilities within the Corporation of the City of Markham we are considered a single organization.

We have also decided to apply to the Canada Council for the Arts for operating funding, similar to what we receive from the Ontario Arts Council. The application is due in April, so we have a lot of work to do in a short space of time. However, the application will comprise much of the same content as for the OAC and also the CADAC statistics that we normally submit in June.

#### **EXHIBITIONS**

The exhibition schedule outlined at the January 13 Board remains in effect. Since then, we opened our Winter 2025 exhibitions on Saturday, January 25. We have also had a whole team meeting with Z'otz\* Collective members to begin planning for the major summer show.

I would like formally to request that the Varley-McKay Art Foundation of Markham provide \$50,000 in support to the Varley Art Gallery of Markham in 2025.

The funds are requested to support a range of activities, all of which align with those outlined in the 2006 Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Markham and the Varley-McKay Art Foundation of Markham. They further align with the goals outlined in *Building Markham's Future Together*, 2020-2026, the City's strategic plan and also those in *Markham is More: Markham's Economic Development and Culture Strategy*, 2023-2027.

The funds would be allocated as follows: \$5,000 towards Education, specifically the Lunch and Learn Program; \$12,000 towards seven separate exhibitions presented in three exhibition rotations, Winter, Summer and Fall; \$13,000 for a range of public programming including exhibition opening events, artist's participation in camp activities and free holiday activities and \$20,000 towards operational support, ensuring an optimal customer experience and safety and security of the art on display.

## **Request Details**

#### 1. Education Programming

\$5,000

Education-related Public Programming focusses on the Lunch and Learn Program.

• The Varley's Lunch & Learn Program, which is now going into its eighth year. The Lunch & Learn Program involves informal talks by contemporary practicing artists, frequently involved in projects at the Varley. The Lunch & Learns also provide our community members the opportunity to learn about current and future exhibitions, and to hear about on-going curatorial research happening at the gallery. This program also supports emerging and established artists by providing them with a forum in which to present their work. \$2,000 is required for zoom licences, youtube channel and sundry costs. The remainder goes toward speaker fees.

## 2. Exhibition Support

\$12,000

The request is for the seven exhibitions featured over the course of the Varley's three annual exhibition rotations: winter, summer and fall 2025. The exhibition program has been developed by Varley Curator Anik Glaude.

Winter: January 25 to May 4, 2025

\$4,000

#### • Karen Kar Yen Law: Better Bitter, curated by Anik Glaude

Markham-based artist Karen Kar Yen Law 羅加欣 works primarily with monoprints, blending the structured layers of printmaking with the fluid expressiveness of painting. Hand-cut stencils are central to her process, creating precise shapes and patterns that build visual layers and reveal or mask parts of the composition. Through colour layering, she forms negative and positive spaces that enhance or obscure underlying forms. Law also incorporates experimental techniques, like using stencils to sun-cure her canvases. Her work is deeply shaped by her Chinese heritage, particularly its cuisine, where balance in flavour – such as the transformation of bitterness – is essential. In her latest work, the bitter melon serves as a symbol for exploring the concept of bitterness, both as a flavour and an emotional experience.

- Beneath the Surface: Stories of Kinship and Connection, curated by Anik Glaude Beneath the Surface: Stories of Kinship and Connection features the evocative works of Emma Nishimura and Gayle Uyagaqi Kabloona. Both artists harness the expressive power of printmaking to illuminate facets of their cultural and familial identities, drawing viewers into deeply personal and universal narratives.
- The Printmaker's Matrix: Process, Image and Innovation curated by Anik Glaude with Amani Assan

This group exhibition showcases prints from the gallery's permanent collection, exploring three interconnected themes: process, image, and innovation. Process unveils the intricate techniques and behind-the-scenes efforts that bring each print to life. Image celebrates the finished works, focusing on their compositions, forms, colours, and meanings. Finally, innovation highlights how artists push the boundaries of printmaking – whether through adopting cutting-edge techniques or reimagining traditional methods. This exhibition offers an accessible introduction to printmaking techniques and methods. As with all our collections-based exhibitions, The Printmaker's Matrix provides a chance to delve deeper into our holdings, uncover fresh insights into overlooked pieces, and bring attention to works that are being displayed for the first time.

Summer: May 24 (TBC) to September 1, 2025 \$4,000

#### • The Z'OTZ\* Collective

The Gallery's major summer exhibition will focus on Z'OTZ\* [sic] Collective. Established in 2004, the collective comprises Nahum Flores, Erik Jerezano, and Ilyana Martinez. These artists collaborate across various mediums, including drawing, painting, sculpture, and most recently, animation. Meeting weekly, they engage in a collective creative process, with each artist contributing to every piece. The artworks are passed among the members, evolving through shared input until they reach completion. Each artist brings their own unique style and approach to the collaborative process, resulting in a final product that not only reflects each artist's sensibility but also embodies something entirely new. The Z'OTZ\* exhibition will occupy both the Intro Gallery and the Main Gallery space. While the specific works have yet to be finalized, we anticipate including framed drawings, new animated pieces, ceramic works, and the creation of a site-specific mural, of the kind for which the collective is particularly well-known - immersive, whimsical and fantastical.

 Virtual Visions: Exploring F.H. Varley's Artistry Through Technology, curated by Anik Glaude

The work of F.H. Varley will be exhibited in a new light thanks to a collaboration between the gallery's curatorial and education teams. Contemporary interventions from contemporary artists will complement paintings and drawings by Varley from the permanent collection.

Fall 2025, September 24, 2025 to January 4, 2026

\$4,000

#### Kejie Linn, curated by Yuluo Anita Wei

The Gallery will mount a solo exhibition by Kejie Lin, again an artist of Chinese heritage based in the region. This will be important as her first public art gallery show. Ms Lin employs both traditional Chinese painting materials and the meticulous technique of traditional Chinese Gongbi paintings, featuring floral motifs, birds and landscape themes as the main subjects. Along with traditional Chinese aesthetics, Lin's intricate ink paintings, explore contemporary themes. The exhibition will be organized by local curator Yuluo Anita Wei, reinforcing the Gallery's dedication to fostering emerging and diverse curatorial voices.

 Shifting Landscapes: Contemporary Visions of Nature, curated by Anik Glaude and Yuluo Anita Wei

Shifting Landscapes is a group exhibition exploring a range of approaches to the depiction of nature in contemporary art. Programmed to complement Keijie Lin's exhibition and help place her work within the large discourse of contemporary Canadian art.

## 3. Public Programming

\$13,000

Funds are requested to mount public programming in relation to our three 2025 exhibition rotations, comprising seven separate installations.

This will include, but is not limited to:

- Three opening reception activities/activations for the launch of each of the 2025 Winter, 2025 Summer and 2025 Fall exhibitions
- An Artist's workshop and participation in Summer camp, and a camp-wide project
- Development, staffing and materials for free public programming activities onsite in conjunction with:

Black History Month (February)
Unionville Festival
Canada Day
Culture Days
Doors Open Markham
Old Tyme Christmas

## 4. Operational Support

\$20,000

These funds are requested, to assist the Varley Art Gallery to meet the following goal identified in the 2006 MOU between the City of Markham and the Varley-McKay Art Foundation:

3b) To encourage appreciation and enjoyment of the visual arts in Markham by providing a facility where every visit will be a warm, friendly and enjoyable experience for all patrons and citizens...

The funds provided will appropriate security for art works and exhibitions. They will also support a warm and welcoming environment, and assist in the promotion of Varley Art Gallery activities, events and programs. This includes underwriting costs associated with new technology: the annual fee to maintain the Varley's new website on a dedicated server (required by the City's IT Department), payments for an app (currently StQry) to run the in-gallery kiosk animating exhibitions (development in progress) and monthly payments to maintain the TipTapPay donation system.
