

Meeting House – What we heard




- Hidden poverty











Figure 1: Average income (constant \$2015) by age groups, 1980-2015*





Investing in neighbourhoods that are falling behind:


The York Region Neighbourhood Development Grants are invested in:

 Markham, Building a Better Milliken. Agincourt Community Services Association will work with Social Services Network, Ebenezer United Church, Family Services York Region and Centre for Immigrant & Community Services to engage local residents and identify opportunities for partnership and collaboration. Together, these organizations will enable residents to continue problem-solving pressing social issues —such as how to better support newcomers, and other community priorities.



Research, Investments & Advocacy on Housing Affordability

- - 10% increase in support for two local agencies through the federal Reaching Home program
 - Successful advocacy for a Portable Housing Benefit as part of the National & Provincial Housing strategies
 - Continued research partnerships to understand housing issues & homelessness across York Region







Supporting youth facing multiple barriers to the labour market:

Career Navigator – Tech Sector

- 176 enrolled in NPower Canada Program (in Markham)
- 88% of resident alumni secured employment and/or enrolled in PSE within 6 months of graduation
- Many Markham based corporate partners
