#### **PURPOSE:**

Pursuant to Part III section 15 of the Procurement Bylaw (No. 2017-8), passed by Council on March 21, 2017, a report shall be submitted to Council on a monthly basis to advise of awarded contracts greater than \$50,000

This report advises Council of all contracts, awarded by the Chief Administrative Officer or Commissioners, or Directors with a total cost exceeding \$50,000 for the month of April 2021

### **BACKGROUND:**

The Procurement Bylaw delegates authority to staff to award contracts if the contract award meets specific criteria. The following chart outlines the contract award approval authority:

#### **BACKGROUND**

The City will be replacing the existing streetlighting system within the Varley Village Area. The existing system, installed in the 1960s, consists of post-top mounted HPS fixtures on 4 metre high metal poles. As the existing system is at the end of service life, the City will be replacing the existing system with new underground cables in a duct, 9.2 metre high concrete poles and LED cobra-head luminaires.

The work includes the following: removal of the 96 existing post top streetlights, supply and installation of 113 new streetlight poles/ arms/ luminaires, 5.7km length of underground cables in a duct, ground rods, hand wells and power supply pedestals.

The project is expected to commence by May 2021 and be completed by December 2021.

On completion of the works, there will be \$2,365 in incremental energy savings to the operating budget due to LED streetlights. The life cycle reserve study will be updated to reflect the new poles and luminaires quantity and cost.

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### **ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS**

The consultant will oversee the construction contract and review, monitor and ensure compliance with contractor environmental submissions. Additionally, they will maintain environmental compliance records complying with environmental statutes and regulations. All construction waste will be properly sorted, recycled and disposed of at an authorized dump, waste treatment site or recycling facility. The new streetlights will be upgraded to LED lighting, which are more energy efficient and dark sky friendly.

The renewal terms (2022-2024) are subject to annual price increase based on the Consumer Price Index for All Items Ontario for the twelve (12) month period ending October 31 in the applicable year and shall not exceed 2%. The contract also includes asphalt cement (AC) price index that adjusts the cost based on the price for asphalt based on changes to the Ministry of Transportations price index on a monthly basis.

Compared to the previous contract 2017-2020 for common items, this contract represents a decrease of 3.22% in unit prices.

The remaining budget of \$103,795.20 will be used to fund the 2021 Pavement Condition Assessment.

The asphalt resurfacing component of the road rehabilitation program serves to ensure the asphalt pavements of the citywide road network are maintained in a state of good repair. Work is undertaken in order to achieve a Pavement Condition Index (PCI) of good or better specific to each road category within the overall road network.

At time of budget submission, high-level estimates are generated for each street to be considered for inclusion in the program. Quantities within these estimates can increase and decrease once construction begins on a selected road and reallocation of funds between vendors within the program may be required. As such, the Director of Operations and the Senior Manager of Procurement and Accounts Payable will be authorized to reallocate funds from this blanket order within the overall Asphalt Resurfacing Program up to a maximum of 20% of the award amount (\$792,380.56 or \$3,961,902.8 x 20%) for the duration of the contract; to a combined annual total not to exceed the annual Asphalt Resurfacing Program budget of \$6,815,800.

In the event funds within the Asphalt Resurfacing Program cannot be reallocated to accommodate increases in the contract, request can be made for additional funding through Non-DC Capital Contingency.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS**

A number of strategies within the Road Rehabilitation Program are environmentally friendly. The program calls for the use of Recycled Asphalt Pavement, RAP, for inclusion in asphalt mix designs as appropriate confirming to Ontario Provincial Standards. The City allows 15% RAP within all asphalt binder courses. All removed asphalt millings are reused by the contractor as part of business operations with regard to asphalt production reducing the use of virgin material.

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### **ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS (Continued)**

1,000 tonnes of graded asphalt millings are provided back to the City, which are then used in various road repair tasks within the City including shouldering.

The designated asphalt production plant is located within close proximity to the Markham geographic boundary reducing accumulative travel distances for trucking operations for both asphalt paving and milling operations thereby reducing the overall carbon footprint through the reduction of greenhouse gases.

#### OPERATING BUDGET AND LIFE CYCLE IMPACT

The next sediment cleaning for this location is included in the life cycle study for year 2041. Pricing will be monitored for the next (2 years/bids) and staff will reassess the lifecycle impact for 2024 life cycle update. There is no incremental operating budget impact.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS**

Sediment cleaning maintains downstream water quality, preserves fish habitat and contributes to a sustainable, healthy ecosystem that is in line with the City's Greenprint initiative. In meeting the requirement of Ministry of Environment and Climate Change (MOECC) Environmental Compliance Approval (ECA), the City carries out pond inspections regularly. Sediment levels are monitored and when the accumulated sediment reaches a level where the removal efficiency is reduced by 5%, ponds are cleaned to ensure that the quality control function of the pond is maintained.

Consequently, Procurement Staff entered into negotiations with the low bidder (Downtown Autogroup) to reduce the budget shortfall. Staff were able to negotiate a price reduction, of \$300 pretax per vehicle, which resulted in a savings of \$915.84 including HST impact (\$207,810.62 - \$206,894.78).

\$1,144.62 of the total budget shortfall of \$14,662.78 will be funded from the Waterworks Capital Contingency account.

### **Budget Shortfall**

Recent vehicle tenders have bids with delivery schedules longer than anticipated and pricing greater than originally budgeted. This is mostly attributed to the impacted supply chains restricting availability due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The units are currently in fair condition, however due to the lengthy delivery times for these vehicles, deferring the units further may result in additional maintenance costs. The higher cost associated with the Waterworks Fleet Replacement is due to the 11' (ft.) body box design.

### **BACKGROUND**

The Regional Municipality of York supplies water to nine (9) area municipalities, including the City of Markham and the City of Richmond Hill. In turn, Markham delivers water to individual consumers. Markham's existing Pressure District 7 (PD7) water system is supplied by the Region's system via a single transmission main from Elgin Mills Road East and Highway 404. The single water supply for PD7 does not provide the redundancy and system security needed as part of the watermain network required for current and future development in the area.

The 2016 York Region Water and Wastewater Master Plan includes a future North Markham Water Servicing project (W20) and this project will provide a long-term secondary water supply for PD7. However this project is scheduled for commissioning between years 2031-2035. The proposed project includes a new PD7 pumping station at the North Markham Reservoir, and 10 km of watermain from the new PD7 pumping station and the existing PD7 water system at Elgin Mills Road and Woodbine Avenue.

Markham is proposing a short-term solution to provide a secondary water supply for PD7 by looping a watermain with the Richmond Hill watermain across Highway 404 until a long-term solution is developed, funded, and constructed by the Region.

The purpose of the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment Study is to identify alternative design concepts and a preferred alignment for the watermain connection from the Richmond Hill PD7 water network to the Markham water network across Highway 404 north of Elgin Mills Road. It is anticipated that the study will commence in April 2021 and be completed by April 2022.

Gow Hastings Architects was founded in 2002 by Valerie Gow and Philip Hastings, both of which have over 20 years of extensive experience in the revitalization of public spaces. Gow Hastings Architects scoring was based on their original submitted price proposal, the City did not revise the scoring based on the negotiated fee reduction.

The bid prices ranged from the lowest being \$55,792.46 to highest being \$75,377.70 inclusive of HST.

On May 29 2018, Council endorsed a recommendation that authorized Staff to engage York Region to conduct a joint planning study to reassess the function of Donald Cousens Parkway extension and 19<sup>th</sup> Avenue. This joint study with York Region is focused on determining if the extension of Donald Cousens Parkway west of Highway 48 in its own right-of-way is necessary or if widening of existing concession and arterial roads in the subject area could provide sufficient traffic capacity to meet future travel demands. York Region and the City will equally fund the study (50/50). Staff anticipate the study will be completed one year after Council has made a decision on the Donald Cousens Parkway Extension.
