4. PERTINENT INFORMATION FROM GUEST SPEAKERS

4.1 Community Safety Data Portal

Police Constable Chris Chezzie and Scott Hurst, Supervisor, Business Intelligence and Data Analytics at York Regional Police presented the York Regional Police Community Safety Data Portal to the committee. This presentation was also given to various municipal councils.

The Community Safety Data Portal was built on ESRI ArcGIS software and is open to the public. An overview of the website (https://community-safety-portal-datayrp.hub.arcgis.com/) was provided, which includes many features and information:

- Dashboards to view trends on community safety and road safety.
- Historic maps included data of the past 5 years (currently 2016-2020) as well as a current map displaying data from 2020 to date. There is also the option to download the data for analysis or offline use.
- The portal allows the community to be aware of and assist with investigations and the public can find local crime prevention officers on the portal.
- Application of filters on injury and fatality related to cycling and pedestrians based on municipalities. Data also shows occurrences by time of day and day of week.
- The mobile friendly version is being developed on this year and hoping to have this available to the public soon.

There was a question on "Crime Stopper" and "Road Watch", and a suggestion to add a reporting function on the web portal. The committee thanks YRP for the presentation, YRP welcomes any comments and questions be directed to businessintelligence@yrp.ca.

5. BUSINESS ARISING FROM LAST MEETING

5.1 CPAC 2022 Workplan

Steve Glassman presented the CPAC 2022 Workplan to the committee which he explained was developed by David Rawcliffe, Peter Miasek and himself, in consultation with City staff. The purpose of the workplan is to concentrate on areas that the committee members are interested in based on the ATMP recommendations.

The workplan also contains the list of subcommittees and members, as well as suggestions for new subcommittees. All the subcommittees require committee member volunteers to take part.

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There was a suggestion to combine some subcommittee groups: bike-share with micro-mobility, and winter pedestrians with pedestrians. Committee members are encouraged to review the new subcommittee list and send an email to the Chair or Vice Chairs to express interests at a later time. Non-CPAC members can also participate in subcommittees.

6. STANDING ITEMS & ON-GOING PROJECTS

6.1 City's Ongoing AT Project Updates

City Staff presented updates on various City's Active Transportation projects, including:

- Rouge Valley Trail: Crossing at Kennedy Road and Wayfinding Plan
- Huntington Trail Footbridge: Continue to work with Infrastructure Ontario
- Milliken Urban Loops Signage: Functional sign layout completed and planned for installation later this year.
- Markham Centre Trail Update: Currently undertaking more topographic and field studies and ESR is anticipated to complete by Spring 2023.
- John Street MUP: revised scope was approved by DSC on Feb 7, construction anticipate to start by Q2/Q3.

The committee discussed what to do with the various loop trails developed last year for Markham Cycling Tours. Some are attractive loops connecting good destinations. They could simply be shown on future maps or have physical signage.

6.2 School Programs & Pilots

Peter Miasek provided an update on the School Streets Test Program and explained that this project is the main focus of the Active School Travel (AST) subcommittee. The school street test pilot involves the temporarily closure of Stricker Ave at John McCrae Public School every Wednesday in May 2022. The working group has informed Councillor Collucci about the pilot and continues to communicate and reach out to the local communities in March and April.

6.8 Subcommittee Updates – Winter Pedestrian

Council Reid McAlpine provided an update on a petition of about 25 homeowners in regards to the Sidewalk implementation work on Carleton Road. The petition may be brought forth to DSC on March 28 that coincides with City Staff Council report on the Sidewalk Implementation Program update. City Staff explained that the Council report serves to provide an update of the sidewalk gap project since 2018 approval, including the communications plan.

6.10 Open Streets

Peter Miasek provided an update on the Open Streets program with has an approved budget for 2022 implementation. The subcommittee held a meeting and brainstormed possible ideas including Markham Road, Carleton Road, Bur Oak Ave and Middlefield Road. The City is also working to obtain sponsorship. The next meeting will be held in 2 weeks and any Committee members are welcome to join.

Councillor Reid McAlpine presented a long form journalism in a newspaper that serves Brampton and Mississauga which spoke on the challenges and safety concerns that come with micro mobility and opposition by accessibility groups. The link to the article will be shared with all CPAC members.

Peter Miasek asked for a new folder be created on the CPAC shared google drive to store reports created by CPAC and subcommittees. City staff will provide the assistance as requested.

Joska Zerczi advised on the Unionville Main Street reconstruction project and inquired CPAC's position on this matter. Councillor McAlpine advised that there is a proposal to reconstruct Main

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Street Unionville with design options to make the street pedestrian focused to calm traffic. It may be helpful for CPAC to contribute to this if there is consensus on which option is best for the community as it is a popular destination.

Anthony Ko asked about membership on CPAC. Staff will consult City Clerks on the CPAC Terms of Reference and committee membership requirements to determine whether there are options or defined responsibilities as a committee member.
