### 9. REGULAR REPORTS - DEVELOPMENT AND POLICY ISSUES

### 9.1 UPDATE ON STREAMLINE DEVELOPMENT APPROVAL FUND AND RECENT PROCESS IMPROVEMENTS (10.0)

Arvin Prasad, Commissioner of Development Services, advised that this item is to provide an update on the Streamline Development Approval Fund since executing the Transfer Payment Agreement between the City and Province in March 2022, and to provide an update on recent development process improvements. Some of the improvements that will be made include conducting an end to end review of the development process, upgrading the ePLAN development review and commenting software, and acquiring GIS software and professional services to build an interface for open data on development and building permit applications. An overview of the interactive applications dashboard, which will replace Preliminary Reports at Development Services Committee meetings on trial basis was provided.

The Committee inquired how frequently the Markham City Builder Forum meets, and noted that it is typically the smaller developers that experience difficulty navigating ePLAN.

Mr. Prasad clarified that Markham City Builders Forum has already met several times in 2022 to date, but typically meets four times per year. Mr. Prasad also clarified that improvements are being made to ePLAN to make it more user friendly.

The Mayor thanked staff for the work they are doing to improve the development process. The Mayor also spoke to the importance of being proactive with respect to continuously improving and streamline processes.

9.2 RECOMMENDATION REPORT GLEN ROUGE HOMES (KENNEDY) INC. APPLICATION FOR ZONING BY-LAW AMENDMENT TO PERMIT 31 TOWNHOUSE UNITS ACCESSED BY A PRIVATE DRIVEWAY AT 7647 KENNEDY ROAD (WARD 8) FILE NO.: PLAN 20 136196 (10.5)

- 7. That Staff be authorized and directed to do all things necessary to give effect to this resolution.

9.3 PROVINCIAL BRIDGE STATION TRANSIT ORIENTED COMMUNITY PROPOSAL - PROGRAM AGREEMENT-IN-PRINCIPLE (13.2)

Arvin Prasad, Commissioner of Development Services, advised that the purpose of this item is to provide an update on the Provincial Bridge Station Transit Oriented Community (TOC) Proposal - Program Agreement-in-Principle. Mr. Prasad explained that on April 14<sup>th</sup>, 2022, the Province issued a Minister's Zoning Order for the Bridge Station TOC, and that the Province is now looking for Markham to sign a TOC Program Agreement-in-Principle (AIP).

Darry Lyons, Senior Manager, Policy & Research, provided a presentation titled "Provincial Bridge Station Transit Oriented Community Proposal-Program Agreement-In- Principle".

The following deputations were provided on the Provincial Bridge Station TOC Proposal – Program AIP:

Graham Churchill expressed concern that municipal power is being eroded and that an autocratic rather than a democratic process is being taken by the provincial government in regards to the proposed High Tech and Bridge Station Transit TOCs. Mr. Churchill advised that Ontario is experiencing a housing affordability crisis rather than a housing supply crisis due to supercharged demand caused by low interest rates and people buying houses as investment properties rather than by municipal red tape. Mr. Churchill suggested that developers should be forced to build within a certain timeframe or they should lose their approval, as there are currently some 400,000 units that have been approved that are not being built in Ontario. Mr. Churchill expressed the following concerns: 1) that developers are able to by-pass municipal governments to get Minister's Zoning Orders to proceed with denser developments; 2) that the Province is planning the TOCs in secrecy; and 3) that the Province will receive cash-in-lieu for parkland in the TOCs rather than the municipal governments. Mr. Churchill asked Council to pass a motion asking the Ombudsman or the Auditor General to investigate the TOC approval process, and the public accounting of all subway funds that have come from developers and how this will impact York Region taxpayers.

Evelin Ellison suggested that the City could challenge the Bridge Station TOC under the *Municipal Act*, as mutual respect was not undertaken during the creation of the legislation. Ms. Ellison expressed concern that the Province was dictating the TOCs without any regard for municipal planning departments. Ms. Ellison encouraged Council to request the Auditor General to investigate provincial agreements made in secrecy regarding the TOC. Ms. Ellison also requested that Council not sign any provincial agreements regarding the TOC that by-pass the municipal planning process.

The Committee discussed the following with respect to the Provincial Bridge Station TOC Proposal – Program Agreement-In-Principle:

- Expressed concern with the provincially led process to implement the Bridge Station TOC;
- Expressed concern that the Province was not taking the City's concerns into consideration;
- Expressed concern that the Province was interfering with the municipal planning process, and that its proposal for the Bridge Station TOC does not align with the City's Langstaff Gateway Secondary Plan;
- Asked about the City's options and questioned why the agreement cannot be discussed in the open session;
- Expressed concern that the Province is not providing the City with the regular cash-in-lieu of parkland in the Bridge Station TOC, and that it appears to be using the money to help fund the subway;
- Expressed concern that there are no plans to include an Automated Vacuum Waste Collection System in the Bridge Station TOC;
- Discussed whether the City should ask the Attorney General of Canada or the appropriate body to investigate the process the Province undertook to approve the Bridge Station TOC;
- Noted the importance of the City working with the Region and affected local municipalities on this matter;

Claudia Storto, City Solicitor and Director of Human Resources, advised that the Provincial Bridge Station TOC Proposal - Program Agreement- In-Principle should be discussed in camera, explaining that any legal document that is being negotiated shall remain confidential, and that this cannot be determined on a unilateral basis

### 11. NOTICES OF MOTION

### 11.1 PREPARING FOR THE IMPACT OF STUDENT HOUSING IN MARKHAM (10.0)

Councillor Keith Irish advised that this item is to provide notice that the motion "Preparing for Impact of Student Housing in Markham", moved by Regional Councillor Jack Heath, and seconded by Councillor Reid McAlpine, will be placed on the May 10<sup>th</sup> Development Services Committee agenda for Council's consideration.

Regional Councillor Jack Heath read the motion out loud.

The Committee consented to the following motion being referred to the May 10, 2022 Development Services Committee, for its consideration:

WHEREAS, in September 2023, students are anticipated to start enrolling at York University's new Markham Campus; and,

WHEREAS, York University Markham Campus will have a student body of 4,200 within four years; and,

WHEREAS, a significant portion of York University Markham students are expected to rent in Markham near the campus; and,

WHERAS, York University has commissioned a student housing study but has not shared this with the City; and,

WHEREAS, York University understands that student housing near Markham Campus including rooming houses and condos could become problematic, and is currently in the <u>early stages of working with the private sector</u> to develop a purpose-built student residence; and,

WHEREAS, Remington is exploring the possibility of building a purpose-built student residence building independently of the York University process; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Markham has no information at its disposal to indicate whether efforts noted above will meet student housing needs for the new York University Markham Campus; and,

WHEREAS, it is a common problem for municipalities across the county in which post-secondary institutions are located that they <u>face major issues</u> with illegal student accommodation around the school; and,

WHEREAS, <u>illegal rooming houses</u> have been discovered in Scarborough near the University of Toronto Scarborough and Centennial College Morningside Campuses, where students have been living in unsafe conditions with as many as 11 in separate rooms under the same roof and paying individual rent, thus violating zoning regulations; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Toronto has recently put forward <u>A New Regulatory</u> <u>Framework for Multi-tenant Houses</u> to amend zoning and licensing-bylaws that have allowed for unlicensed operations and unsafe living conditions for tenants; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Oshawa solved their problem of illegal and unsafe rooming houses and bad student behaviour near Ontario Tech University (formerly UOIT) by requiring a <u>licence</u> to rent most properties and by offering incentives for developers to build purpose-built student accommodation; and,

WHEREAS, on January 24<sup>th</sup>, Oshawa Council directed staff to undertake a consultation regarding a potential city-wide <u>expansion to its Residential Rental Housing Licensing</u> program and they are currently in the process of such consultation; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Hamilton has recently launched its two-year <u>Rental</u> <u>Housing Licensing pilot program</u> mandating property owners in certain parts of the city to apply for a rental licence for every rental property with four or fewer dwelling units as a response to illegal dwelling and secondary suite units, absentee landlords, poor property standards and inadequate yard maintenance; and,

WHEREAS, poor maintenance of rental properties is already a common problem in Markham; and,

WHEREAS, illegal and unsafe rooming houses accommodating students and others are known to already exist in Markham; and,

WHEREAS, the experiences of GTHA municipalities which are home to postsecondary institutions clearly demonstrate the importance of proactive planning in anticipation of the new York University Markham Campus; and,

WHEREAS, without foresight and proper planning, the City of Markham will likely experience the same issues as other GTHA municipalities; therefore,

1. BE IT RESOLVED THAT Markham Council direct City staff to study the potential implications of student housing around York University Markham Campus and elsewhere in the city, and report back via the Unionville Subcommittee on viable solutions to address these anticipated issues.

Whereas City staff and officials have been meeting with the Province of Ontario to resolve objections by Markham Council pertaining to the Transit Oriented Community (TOC) as proposed by Infrastructure Ontario at the YNSE Bridge Station;

Whereas an enhanced Minister's Zoning Order was issued on April 14, 2022 which the City of Markham rejects;

Whereas Bill 109 amended the Planning Act on April 14, 2022 reducing the parkland requirements in provincial TOCs;

Whereas the Province of Ontario is requesting that the City of Markham enter into a TOC Agreement in Principle ("AIP") which is to be executed by April 29, 2022 and sets out the implementation of the TOC processes and future requirements.

### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- The City of Markham advise the Province of Ontario that the City does not agree with the AIP as it is inconsistent with the City's interests, priorities, and concerns and will therefore not execute it in its current form; and,
- 2. Staff be directed to continue negotiating the AIP with the Province to ensure that critical elements of the City's interests are addressed in the AIP; and further,
- 3. Staff be directed to report back to Council on the outcome of the negotiations.
