<h3><b>1.0 Introduction</b></h3>	
<b>1.1 The Greater Golden Horseshoe</b>	<p>Proposed changes/additions to the context for Section 1 of the Growth Plan include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Updated profile of the regional economy and its global prominence;</li><li>• Increased focus on natural assets and the importance of protection for future generations;</li><li>• Recognition of the long history of human settlement in the area;</li><li>• Key challenges on the horizon for the fast-growing region (some of which have recently emerged or gained prominence over the past 10 years); and</li><li>• Acknowledgement of the importance of consulting with First Nations and Métis communities and the requirement to implement the Plan in a manner consistent with the recognition and affirmation of existing Aboriginal and treaty rights.</li></ul>

<b>2.1 Context</b>	<p>Proposed changes/additions to the context for Section 2 include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• References to the Ontario Climate Change Strategy, 2015, and long-term greenhouse gas emissions reduction targets to 2030 and 2050;</li><li>• Connecting how planning for “complete communities” helps Ontario move toward “net-zero communities” (a proposed new defined term); and</li><li>• Introduction of a proposed new defined term “strategic growth areas”, which would replace the term “intensification areas”</li></ul>

3.1 Context	Proposed changes/additions to the context for Section 3 include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• New details on stormwater management to emphasize the connections between preparing for extreme weather events and adapting to a changing climate; and</li><li>• Updated references to Building Together, the Infrastructure for Jobs and Prosperity Act, 2015, the Ontario Great Lakes Strategy and the Great Lakes Protection Act, 2015</li></ul>
3.2 Policies for Infrastructure to Support Growth	For the most part, the existing policy directions for Infrastructure to Support Growth would be retained and, in some cases, updated and clarified.

3.2.1.3	New policy to use provincial infrastructure investment to facilitate intensification and <i>strategic growth areas</i>  <b>See Report for Comment and Recommendation 1.20</b>

<b>4.1 Context</b>	<p>Proposed changes/additions to the context for Section 4 include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• New components in this section refer to the identification and protection of “water resource systems”, “natural heritage systems” and the “agricultural system” and their importance with regard to climate change;</li><li>• Recognition of the importance of “cultural heritage resources” and “mineral aggregate resources”;</li><li>• Setting out context of natural areas as carbon sinks to sequester carbon and that the province will develop guidance materials to support municipalities in developing inventories and strategies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in support of provincial emissions reduction targets and the move towards “net-zero communities”</li></ul>
<b>4.2 Policies for Protecting What is Valuable</b>	<p>New policies refer to identification and protection of water resource systems, natural heritage systems and the agricultural system, generally aligned with the Greenbelt Plan</p>
<b>4.2.1.1 and 4.2.1.2</b>	<p>New policies requiring municipalities to identify and protect a water resource system, using watershed planning as a basis</p>
<b>4.2.1.3</b>	<p>New policy would require watershed planning to inform decisions on new or expanded infrastructure; subwatershed studies required before approval of urban expansion boundaries, and large scale development and secondary plans in the DGA</p> <p><i>See Report for Comment and Recommendation 1.13</i></p>
<b>4.2.2.1</b>	<p>Provides for comprehensive, integrated and long term approach to maintain, restore or enhance natural heritage features and areas</p>

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<b>4.2.2.2</b>	New policy would require municipalities to identify and protect a natural heritage system as mapped by the Province in their official plans
<b>4.2.2.3</b>	Provides for municipalities to refine the boundaries of the provincially defined natural heritage system
<b>4.2.2.4 and 4.2.2.5</b>	New policy to incorporate Greenbelt- level protections for natural heritage systems, etc, while allowing some flexibility in order to accommodate growth
<b>4.2.2.5 and 4.2.2.6</b>	4.2.2.5 would exempt the natural heritage system within settlement areas - as they exist as of the effective date of the Growth Plan, 2016 - from new requirements, but would clarify that policy 2.1 of the PPS 2014 would still apply; 4.2.2.6 requires municipalities to establish policies and designations for the natural heritage system within urban area boundary expansions

<h2>5.0 Implementation and Interpretation</h2>	
5.1 Context	<p>Proposed changes/additions to the context for Section 5 include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Overview of mechanisms that would help to implement the Growth Plan, 2016, if approved;</li> <li>• Expectations for the role of upper- and single-tier municipalities in implementing the Growth Plan through ‘municipal comprehensive review’, the definition of which would be updated to clarify that it must be implemented under section 26 of the Planning Act and is to be undertaken by the upper- or single-tier municipality; and</li> <li>• Clarification that the province would ensure ongoing consultation with its partners in the implementation of the Growth Plan, 2016, if approved, including First Nations and Métis communities.</li> </ul>
5.2 Policies for Implementation and Interpretation	<p>For the most part, the existing policy directions for Implementation and Interpretation would be retained and the policies in Section 5 would be updated and clarified to provide additional direction for policy implementation and interpretation. Other technical policies that are currently located in other parts of the Growth Plan are proposed to be moved to this more technical section.</p>
5.2.2.1 and 5.2.2.2	Supplementary direction to be provided by Minister and the Province

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5.2.3.2	New policy direction for upper-tier to identify minimum densities for <i>strategic growth areas</i>  <i>See Report for Comment and Recommendation 1.4</i>
5.2.4.2	Policy indicates that the population and employment forecasts in an upper-tier official plan that is in effect continues to apply until the upper-tier has applied the 2041 forecasts in Schedule 3 and those forecasts are in effect  <i>See Report for Comment and Recommendation 1.3</i>
5.2.5.4	Clarification that the intensification and density targets do not apply to Special Policy Areas
Definitions	Many of the proposed new definitions are replicating and harmonized with those found in the PPS 2014, and align with the terms used in the Greenbelt Plan, Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan and Niagara Escarpment Plan. Some terms used in the Growth Plan including ‘complete communities’, ‘municipal comprehensive review’ are revised.
