Re: HERITAGE Designated Property of John Eby Reesor House
8402 Steeles Ave East Markham

It has come to the attention of the Reesor Family in Canada that Infrastructure Ontario has requested a permit from Markham for the demolition of the house at 8402 Steeles Ave East.

We are extremely concerned over this request as this is a Designated Heritage Building.

We believe that the Reesor story including this homestead has a significant role in the City of Markham's heritage and Cedar Grove's early history.

This brick house appears to have been built in 1853 by John Eby Reesor (1806-1864), the second son of Peter Reesor (1775-1854).

The house was continuously inhabited for well over 150 years and during this time there has been an ongoing line of direct Reesor descendants living in the home and farming the land (Concession 11, Lots 1, 2, 3 and 4).

In the early 1970's, this corner of Markham was expropriated by the Province for the purpose of developing a satellite city, Cedarwood which was intended to accompany the Federal expropriation of land for building an airport.

The expropriated homes in affected areas were then rented out to prospective tenants.

This included the property at 8402.

It continued to be rented until approximately 4 years ago when the Province discontinued the practice for this particular home. To date the house remains vacant.

## FACT SHEET re: JOHN EBY REESOR HOUSE 8402 Steeles Ave East MARKHAM

## **Brief Background**

- In 1796, Peter Reesor (1775-1854) journeyed on horseback from Franklin County, Pennsylvania to scout for land in Markham area
- in 1804 Peter, parents, siblings and their families made the arduous trek from Pennsylvania in five Conestoga wagons to settle here .....and the story began.
- \* John Eby Reesor (1806-1864) was the second son of Peter Reesor

\*the house at 8402 Steeles was part of Lot 1, 2, 3 & 4, Concession 11 \*the house was built in 1853 by John Eby Reesor

- \* John EBY Reesor and wife Mariah Burkholder had five children
- Simeon (1829-1909) farmed Lot 7& 8 Concession 5 Scarborough 18 Reesor Road and owned and operated a local sawmill (Lot 1, Conc. 9), Raised 8 children
- Noah (1831-1909) farmed 7501 Steeles Ave E, Raised 5 children
- Christian (1833-1915) minister and bishop of Reesor Mennonite Church, as well farmed on Lot 1, Conc. 5, Scarborough 8327 Steeles Ave E. Raised 4 children
- Benjamin B. Reesor (1836-1917) youngest son was willed the family property where he farmed and raised 12 children, all born in the house at 8402 Steeles.
- Susannah (1839-1926) married John Diller farmed Lot 1 Conc.6 Scarborough, Raised 9 children.
- All descendents made significant contributions to the community.
- All are buried in the Reesor Mennonite Cemetery on the Markham Pickering Townline.
- \*John Eby Reesor was a farmer and Minister in the Reesor Mennonite Church
- \*John Eby donated a portion of his farm at the south/east corner of the property for log Church/School and Cemetery (where many decendants are buried).

- \*Later this log building was replaced by current Reesor Mennonite Meeting House on the Markham Pickering Townline (restorative renovations are currently in progress)
- \*The remaining property & house at 8402 were willed to John Eby's fourth and youngest son Benjamin B. Reesor
- \*Upon Benjamin B Reesor's demise the property and house were willed to his sixth son Abram L. Reesor, who farmed the land and lived on the premises until 1929
- Abram L's one daughter was also born at 8402
- At that time 5 acres was severed at the south/west side of the property and the house built (now 8328 Steeles Ave). House still occupied by Abram's grandaughter and family (6th generation on the original property).
- Remaining property and house at 8402 were sold to nephew Willis B. Reesor
- Willis B Reesor and his family of seven children born, raised and lived in the house at 8402 and farmed the land for over 40 years.
- expropriation and tenancy prevailed until 2011

\*As outlined in the Reesor Family Genealogy in Canada -A Trail through the Centuries 2004 edition approximately 2000 Reesor Family descendents have a direct line to this homestead.
