The Cycling and Pedestrian Advisory Committee convened at 7:05 p.m. with David Rawcliffe presiding as Chair.

### 1. MINUTES OF THE MARKHAM CYCLING & PEDESTRIAN ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING HELD ON JANUARY 15, 2015

The January 15, 2015 Cycling & Pedestrian Advisory Committee (CPAC) meeting minutes were approved as presented.

### 2. STANDING ITEMS FROM 2014 BUSINESS PLAN

### Cycling on Sidewalks

The Committee was advised of the next steps relative to the proposed motion to permit cycling on sidewalks. Staff indicated that if this motion is approved by Council it will be on their list of things to do, but not as a priority.

### Project-Specific Environmental Assessment (EA) Designs

Alan Brown, Director of Engineering provided an update on the 2015 EA projects noting that some of the projects are subject to Capital Budget approval. Staff advised that they will consult with the committee in developing the design.

<u>Post meeting note</u>: The cycling facilities on the Highway 404 - Highway 7 to 16th Avenue flyover are on-road bike lanes and not segregated cycle tracks as discussed at the meeting. (See Appendix A)

There was brief discussion regarding the timeline and funding relative to the Lake to Lake Cycling Route and Walking Trails.

### Neighbourhood Walkability Audits

Staff provided an update regarding the walkability audit being performed by Public Space Workshop, Paul Young. It was agreed that Mr. Young will present the results of the audit at the April 2015 CPAC meeting.

### 3. EDUCATION & OUTREACH

### 7th Annual GIRO and Cycling Day in Markham

Zhain Khan addressed the Committee and provided an update regarding the proposal to hold a Tour of Markham together with the annual GIRO and the location will be at the PanAm Centre. He advised that they have met with Engineering staff and Corporate Communications staff. It was noted that the following information needs to be finalized:

- Confirm date (considering September 27, 2015)
- A sponsorship package

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### • Confirm cycling route for a 10K, 20K and 30K ride <u>Masters Research Thesis</u>

Lindsay Taylor addressed the Committee advising that she is currently a Masters student at Royal Roads University and would like to conduct a study on beginner commuter cyclists in Markham and Richmond Hill in the Spring. She delivered a PowerPoint presentation entitled "An Exploration Study of Beginner Commuter Cyclists in Markham & Richmond Hill." Lindsay advised that she would like input from CPAC to ensure that there are no gaps in her research and would like to obtain their support.

It was suggested that her presentation be forwarded to the Committee members.



## Findings from the Pedestrian Death Review 2010, Office of the Chief Coroner for Ontario:

- 35% of fatally injured pedestrians were aged 65 or older even though they represent only 13% of the population;
- 63% of pedestrians killed at intersections were 65 or older;
- 6% of fatally injured pedestrians were under the age of 16 and of these, 20% ran out into the street;
- 33% of fatally injured pedestrians acted in a manner which caused or contributed to the crash;
- More pedestrian injuries and deaths every year after daylight saving time begins


