Re: Steeles Avenue and 9th Line

Second update on Traffic Control Signal Justification

This memo updates you on the status of the traffic control signals for the intersection of Steeles Avenue and 9<sup>th</sup> Line (see reverse side of page for location map). The Engineering Department's last update to you was on April 14, 2008 via email. At that time, we indicated to you that the City of Toronto's traffic study found the signal warrants were not met at the subject intersection and that we were concerned that the study was conducted under unfavourable weather conditions. The City of Toronto agreed to conduct another traffic study to assess the justification for signals at the subject intersection.

The Engineering Department has now received a second study from the City of Toronto and the technical warrants for the installation of traffic control signals are not met. A summary table has been provided below showing the warrants for a signal as per the Ontario Traffic Manual.

Any <u>one</u> of the three justifications must meet 100% to warrant a signal. Alternatively, signals will be warranted if any <u>two</u> of the three justifications meet 80%. Based on the table, Toronto staff advised that signals are not warranted at this time.

As warrants 1 and 2 are close to meeting, we have requested the City of Toronto to undertake another study in 6 months. City of Toronto staff advised that when the intersection does meet the warrants, they will prioritise this intersection and program it in their capital program but could not guarantee when it would be constructed.

In reference to Justification 3 – Collision Hazards, more detail has been provided below. A five year collision report has been conducted based on Toronto Police Service collision records. Toronto staff advised that the collision records do not meet the average of five accidents per year over three years.

I have asked the Region of York to include this matter into future negotiations regarding the Donald Cousens Parkway and Steeles Avenue East jurisdiction. I will keep you posted on the progress of this matter.
