Status Update

- On December 4, 2007, staff provided an update on the Proposed Tree Preservation By-law to Development Services Committee
- On December 11, 2007, Council approved the following recommendations:
- 1. That a Tree Preservation By-law Task Force be formed, and
- 2. That the Tree Preservation By-law Task Force report back to Development Services Committee



Status Update

- The Tree Preservation By-law Task Force included Regional Councillor T. Wong; Regional Councillor J. Heath; Councillor V. Burke; Councillor E. Shapero; Linda Irvine and Carolyn Stobo met on:
- 1. December 18, 2007
- 2. December 19, 2007
- 3. January 16, 2008
- 4. February 7, 2008



Task Force Recommendations

- That a 20 cm (8") DBH standard be adopted for the entire Town of Markham (consistent with the neighbouring municipalities).
- (Note: Markham is also covered by the Region of York By-law which protects all woodlots 0.2 ha (0.5 acres) to 1.0 ha (2.47 acres) and woodlands of 1.0 ha (2.47 acres) or greater.)



Exemptions

Exemptions under the Municipal Act, 2001:

- 1. tree removal undertaken by a municipality or local board. (By-law to include the definition of a "local board" in the *Municipal Act, 2001*)
- 2. tree removal as a condition of approval of a site plan
- 3. tree removal as a condition of a plan of subdivision or consent
- 4. tree removal as a condition of a development permit
- 5. woodlots and woodlands covered by the Region of York Bylaw



Exemptions

ADDITIONAL EXEMPTIONS RECOMMENDED:

- 1. hazard tree removal
- 2. property standards order removal.
- 3. emergency work tree removal.
- 4. maintenance or pruning in accordance with Good Arboricultural Practice.
- 5. tree removal on rooftop gardens, in indoor courtyards, solariums or raised podiums.
- 6. nursery business trees.

DO NOT EXEMPT federal or provincial government activities



Permit System

- Removal of trees other than Exempt trees will require a permit.
- PERMIT APPLICATIONS ARE REQUIRED AND SUBJECT TO REVIEW BY BY-LAW ADMINISTRATOR / COORDINATOR FOR:
- 1. dead, diseased or damaged trees as certified by a qualified tree expert. (Administrator/ coordinator of the By-law has the authority to obtain third-party opinion.)



Permit System

- 2. trees that are causing structural damage to load bearing structures, drains or buildings. (With resident to provide proof/evidence of problem and subject to Town inspection and a determination by the Administrator / Coordinator if removal is necessary.)
- 3. Tree removal associated with a building demolition permit (tree permit subject to parameters being set in permit for tree cutting zone)



Permit System Cont'd

- 4. Tree removal associated with a building permit for construction of a building or building addition/extension 10 m² or greater (tree removal permit subject to arborist's report confirming removal is necessary)
- 5. Tree removal associated with an in-ground pool enclosure permit (tree removal permit subject to Administrator / Coordinator being satisfied tree removal is required if there is no reasonable alternative location for the pool)



Permit System Cont'd

6. a tree is a "substantial nuisance" (substantial nuisance to be defined in by-law)

Note: Proposed "Invasive Tree Species" permit has been removed by the Tree Preservation By-law Task Force



Permit Conditions

PERMIT CONDITIONS MAY INCLUDE, WHERE APPROPRIATE:

- Provision of a qualified arborist's report
- Replacement plantings for non-residential zoned properties
- Landscape and Restoration Plans
- One or more Tree Management Plans



Tree Management Plans

- Recommendation to allow golf courses and cemeteries etc. to have tree management plans prepared by a qualified arborist and approved by the Town of Markham
- Upon approval, the landowner would have to follow the plan when cutting or planting trees
- Any contravention of the Tree Management Plan would be a contravention of the By-law
- Permits to remove trees would be granted in accordance with the approved plan



Permit Fees

Examples:

Town of Richmond Hill: \$150 + \$50 for each extra tree

City of Mississauga: \$200 - \$400 (depending on # trees)

City of Pickering: \$100

City of Stoney Creek: 1 tree \$0; 2-10 trees \$25;

11-20 trees \$50, +20 trees \$100

City of Vancouver: \$25 for 1 tree/year; \$45 for 2nd tree;

\$74 for each tree after that

City of Victoria: \$30

Region of York: \$25 - \$500 depending on type of

cutting



Recommended Permit Fee

- Recommended permit fee of \$200 for the first tree and \$100 for each additional tree
- No charge for confirming exemptions from permit applications
- Revenue would be used to offset administration, enforcement and replanting program costs



Appeals

- Appeals to OMB from tree removal permit refusals are no longer available (former section 136 repealed).
- Recommendation that permit refusal appeals be heard by the Town's Licensing Committee.



Additional Recommendations

- By-law to include minimum fines as prescribed by Section 429 of the *Municipal Act*, 2001
- Policy to be developed and approved by Council directing staff to seek higher fines than minimum due to environmental impacts and community health concerns associated with tree removal
- By-law to include provisions to seek orders under Section 431 to discontinue or to correct a contravention with other actions such as replanting.



Staffing Implications

Based on a survey of other municipalities with tree by-laws, the consultant recommends that:

- One new permanent full-time position be created (Technical Coordinator in Parks Operations) to administer the by-law and manage the associated educational program
- Staff at the Contact Centre and Town by-law enforcement officers be trained in the scope, application and enforcement of this by-law.
- Future staffing requirements will be determined based on annual monitoring of permit applications, permits approved and enforcement activities.



Other Staffing Implications cont'd

- Bylaw Enforcement has agreed to enforce the By-law using existing resources.
- The Contact Centre has agreed to: be the first point of contact; answer resident inquiries; and take in permit applications.
- Corporate Communications has agreed to assist with the promotion of the educational program using existing marketing tools only.



Next Steps

- Based on the recommendations of the Tree Preservation Bylaw Task Force, staff will bring forward a final report and Tree Preservation By-law for enactment as soon as possible
- The date the Tree Preservation By-law comes into effect is to coincide with the timing of filling the new Administrator / Coordinator position.
