Markham Fire and Emergency Services continues to be a leader in the fire service. Departments from across Canada have contacted us requesting information on our training, prevention and education programs. Staff from Markham have gone on to serve as Chief Officers not only here at home in York Region but throughout the province.

This past year has seen several changes implemented to improve service. All front run apparatus are outfitted with computers and are equipped with Global Positioning Systems and Automatic Vehicle Locaters allowing for the closest apparatus to be dispatched to an emergency. A pre-plan program of our industrial/commercial buildings was implemented to identify hazards which will assist us if there were a fire. Fire Prevention staff also completed audits and fire drills at all our Vulnerable Sectors Occupancies (seniors residences, hospitals, etc.) as mandated by the Office of the Fire Marshal, and all front run apparatus were equipped with EpiPens which will improve our response to medical emergencies.

As we move forward in 2015 we will continuously review the recommendations of the Master Fire Plan and Fire Underwriters Survey and implement as necessary to maintain the desired level of service as set by Council.

We welcomed fourteen new firefighters, one alarm room operator and one plans examiner while bidding a fond farewell to District Chief Dave Irving; Captain/Acting District Chief John Hummell; Captains Jim Jones, Dave Nobert, Fred Cockburn, and Glen Stephenson; Firefighters Murray Forgie, Dan Eastman, Kristopher Mackenzie and Mark Francis, as well as Alarm Room Operator Dana Kearns.

As a department and with the much appreciated support of Commissioner Brenda Librecz, Chief Administrative Officer Andy Taylor, Mayor Frank Scarpitti and members of Council, we will continue on our journey to excellence.

Prevention

Keeping Markham residents safe is accomplished on many levels – from offering fire safety education to fighting fires. Fire prevention is a key component in fire protection. The Fire Prevention team inspects Markham buildings on a regular basis to ensure they meet the current fire code. Our team works side by side with property owners to ensure they explore every avenue possible for compliance. Legal action is a last resort. Our prevention team consistently performs inspections in a thorough and respectful manner. We also review pre-construction site plans to ensure that any new building built in Markham meets the most current fire regulations and that these regulations are adhered to during the construction and occupancy phases.

The mission of the Fire Prevention Division is to promote a fire safe community through the delivery of effective prevention and training programs. Fire prevention and public education are the most cost effective and successful means of providing fire protection to the community. Although they may occupy less prominent positions, the role they play is of vital importance.

Fire Prevention Officers have expert knowledge about the Fire Code and its application. Their knowledge and good judgment is called upon to make assessments and decisions about the fire and life safety in the buildings in our community. These decisions may involve immediate threats to life, building closures, and fire and environmental issues. Fire prevention officers ensure fire protection systems in buildings operate, enabling people to evacuate safely in the event of an emergency. They contribute greatly to public safety.

Our **Plans Examiners** review and comment on plans and specifications submitted to the Fire Services for compliance with Provincial Acts and Regulations such as the Fire Protection and Prevention Act (FPPA), the Ontario Fire Code, the Ontario Building Code, Municipal By-laws and other related fire and life safety standards. They also conduct comprehensive fire prevention inspection/surveys and acceptance tests of fire protection and life safety systems for all classes of buildings and occupancies in the City.

PERSEVERANCE

Vulnerable Occupancy Program

In 2014 the Office of the Fire Marshal and Emergency Management (OFMEM) introduced new legislation under the retrofit section of the Ontario Fire Code 9.7 Care Occupancies. What this included was a significant amount of changes that would be required to our vulnerable occupancies, which includes group homes, retirement homes as well as long term care facilities.

The program consisted of 3 components; a full inspection (including retrofit where applicable); complete review of the fire safety plan; and a timed fire drill. The timed fire drill needed to be reviewed and approved by the Chief Fire Official and then witnessed to confirm completion. Our Prevention Division was one of the first municipalities to act, quickly setting an aggressive 9-step process which would ensure all of our deliverables would be met by the end of the calendar year. Our department was one of only a few municipalities that completed all the OFMEM requirements by the end of 2014. Our Prevention Officers worked successfully in their assigned teams and exceeded our target which was an accomplishment we celebrated. The program is now required to be performed on an annual basis and we look forward to continuing our great work on this program.

Inspection Orders

At the end of 2014 our Prevention Division switched its enforcement strategy to meet the Provincial Standards set out by the OFMEM in a technical guideline in 2012. In previous years enforcement was accomplished through a Record of Inspection which allowed discretion on compliance time frames within a 6 month period prior to prosecution. Now through the use of Inspection Orders, which is required under the FPPA, 1997, a 30 or 90-day compliance time frame with no discretion is adhered to. If, at the expiry of these time frames full compliance is not achieved, prosecution is advanced right away. This has forced our division to really step up our customer service initiatives to ensure that property owners as well as City of Markham facility managers understand the full implications of our inspections. Our staff has handled this transition professionally and have been seeing an increase in compliance in City facilities and in the community.

Public Education



The best way to reduce the number of fires and protect Markham residents in their homes is to provide them with the education they need to protect themselves and their families. We deliver our public education programs to our ethnically diverse community, offering our materials in a number of different languages. We partner with local media groups to get our message out to Markham residents as efficiently and effectively as possible.

Smoke/Carbon Monoxide Alarm Program

The Smoke/Carbon Monoxide (CO) alarms program outlines a uniform approach for the distribution of smoke alarms and CO alarms throughout the City of Markham. By providing residents with a Smoke/CO alarm in their home, Markham Fire & Emergency Services is providing customer service while ensuring compliance with the Ontario Fire Code. This program is also reinforced with community presentations and public service announcements with various media outlets.

COMPASSION

Markham Fire & Emergency Services is regularly out in the City of Markham community throughout the year, engaging residents and providing fire safety tips. These events include Emergency Preparedness Week, Markham Fair, Fire Prevention Week, Carbon Monoxide Awareness Week and community festivals throughout the Year.

Cadet Program

Our Cadet program runs the second semester of the school year. The first known program of its kind, the Markham Fire & Emergency Services Cadet program is designed specifically for high school students who are developmentally delayed. This program allows these students who, by nature of the fire service environment, would not normally gain exposure to the day to day duties of Markham Fire & Emergency Services staff.

This year we welcomed students from Bur Oak Secondary School. Our three cadets spent one day each week for 18 weeks with Markham Fire & Emergency Services, gaining experience in the divisions of Fire Suppression, Fire Prevention, Public Education, Communications and Mechanical. The day to day duties of each division were explained to the students in both theory and practical demonstrations, after which each student had the opportunity to demonstrate what they had learned. In addition to gaining this exposure to the fire service, the students learned transferrable skills such as professionalism, punctuality, and respect for authority.

Just as the Cadet program benefits these students, so does it benefit Markham Fire & Emergency Services. It has allowed us to grow as a department in ways that we had not previously considered. This program brings our entire department together, both in the application of our skills and in our common support for these students.

Communications

Communications plays a critical role in assisting Markham residents with emergency and non-emergency service requests. The team, ranging in years of experience from 1 to 25, handled approximately 60,000 incoming and outgoing telephone calls to assist Markham residents in 2014. Of these, a total of 6,910 emergency responses were generated and managed by the Communications Division.

The Alarm Room Operator is the first point of emergency contact for someone who is often having one of the worst days of their lives. These team members have to be compassionate and empathetic, yet able to be firm enough on the telephone to get key information from callers during stressful circumstances, to be able to generate the proper response to the emergency. Listening and interpretive skills are of the utmost importance, as is the ability to work as a part of the team, with the goal of providing whatever assistance is possible to those in need.

In July 2014, Alarm Room Operator Dana Kearns resigned to pursue other interests, after almost 15 years working in the Communications Division of Markham Fire and Emergency Services. We wish her the best in her future endeavours.


The Communications Division welcomed a new member as a replacement for Dana Kearns, when Natalie Sanders joined the Communications Division in October 2014.

The York Region 800 MHz radio was replaced with the latest state-or-the-art 700 MHz radio system. Markham Fire & Emergency Services transitioned to the new system on November 3, 2014.

Mechanical

Markham's mechanical team is responsible for the maintenance and repair of the Markham Fire and Emergency Services fleet. This fleet includes suppression equipment, fire prevention, education, mechanical and training vehicles, as well as three trailers. The maintenance and repair of our vehicles, hydraulics, tools, pumps, ladders, hoses, small engines and firefighting equipment is a key component of our overall objective to deliver excellent customer service to all Markham residents. Annual vehicle and ladder certification were completed as well. In 2014 the division processed over 500 work orders.

Our mechanics also participated in the Ontario Fire College Mechanical Officer program and Spartan Chassis school to keep the fleet running smoothly.

Training

The Training Division consists of a Chief Training Officer and four Training Officers. They work with all the divisions within Markham Fire and Emergency Services; representatives from other fire services; qualified on-shift instructors; and educational institutions to achieve our goal of facilitating the advancement of knowledge, skills and attitude of our staff.

The training programs highlighted below were conducted in 2014, to incorporate and adapt to the changing needs of the modern industry, as well as to stay current with the existing programs and maintain proficiency with set standards.

Additional Medical Personnel Protective Equipment Training

As part of the ongoing efforts to enhance Markham Fire and Emergency Services readiness to manage various communicable diseases during medical responses, the training division with guidance from the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care developed procedures, and trained suppression personnel in heighten personnel protective equipment and procedures.

The training will better prepare staff to manage occupational hazards associated with medical responses, including the donning and doffing of protective equipment and safe handling of potentially bio-hazardous waste.

Ice/Water Rescue Training

Ice/Water Rescue training including classroom and practical water based and shore based scenarios was conducted to provide validation and continued comfort level on knowledge base. On-shift Instructors working with Training Division conduct annual Ice/Water maintenance training.

PROTECTION

Emergency Medical Training, Defibrillation, and EpiPen

In collaboration and under the direction of our Medical Director, a new Medical Directives Manual was released. Operational adjustments were relayed to crews to ensure consistency and compliance.

In co-ordination with the Medical Director and Red Cross training, EpiPens were purchased, introduced and put into service on all response apparatus.

All Fire Prevention staff were trained to the Red Cross First Aid and CPR level to provide professional competency and a more seamless continuity of care should the need arise.





TargetSolutions: Online Training

Markham Fire and Emergency Services incorporated an internet-based training program to provide on-line training, training record management, and report generation.

TargetSolutions tracking system records fire department training and all types of operational records. The system is loaded with ready-made electronic documents for tracking recertification, daily training drills, inspections and more.

Chief Training Officer Mike Bekking conducted training sessions for all fire staff and training which was completed at the end of November.

This innovative technology will assist our department to operate more effectively and efficiently.

Suppression

Every year our staff respond to emergency situations and fight fires throughout Markham. We take special precautions to limit the amount of damage suffered to any structure. We also take the steps necessary to preserve as many belongings as we possibly can without compromising the speed with which we extinguish a fire. Although there are many dangers associated with firefighting, we take great pride in providing this vital service to our residents in the most professional manner possible.

Our well-trained firefighters work tirelessly with passion and determination to protect the lives and property of those who live, work or play in Markham. The Suppression team responded to a total of 6,910 emergency incidents during 2014, which resulted in a total of 12,397 vehicles dispatched to emergency incident locations. The nature of these emergencies included medical, motor vehicle collisions, remote alarms, hazardous material and of course, fires. In addition to emergency response, we provide fire prevention and public education support. In 2014, the suppression team attended over 200 community events in support of our public education programs. These visits consisted of the firefighters attending events, festivals, fairs, and community BBQs; providing a fire truck tour with a description of the equipment on the truck and the firefighter's role within the community. The crews also addressed any home fire safety questions.





Number of Vehicles Dispatched, 2014










Number of Incidents By Ward, 2010 - 2014


