
#### The Goal

- Review of tree planting data for the decade prior to 2007 revealed an average annual rate of 7,500 trees planted/year
- A cross-commission team developed a four year, multi-faceted tree planting initiative: the Markham Trees for Tomorrow Program, to achieve the goal of planting 75,000 new trees
- Annual planting targets of increasing increments were set to fulfil the program's objectives

#### Trees for Tomorrow: Moving Forward

#### Legacy Items

- Confirmed commitment by all departments to intensify tree planting component of all projects whenever possible
- All departments will reference the Trees for Tomorrow Streetscape Manual to incorporate best practice prescriptions as required
- Continue to adapt and improve maintenance practices to optimize tree growth and health

### Trees for Tomorrow: Long Term View

- Program elements will be identified and incorporated annually in Operations annual operating budget for Council's consideration
- Program elements to include: continued support of NGO partners (LEAF, Evergreen, Friends of the Rouge Watershed, 10,000 Trees, etc) via Trees for Tomorrow Fund to foster and build community engagement with Tree planting, Stewardship, Community Outreach and Educational opportunities
- Develop long term management strategy (UFORE) to maintain and enhance Markham's Urban Forest and adapt the program accordingly
