MESSAGE FROM FIRE CHIEF



Bill Snowball Fire Chief

t is a pleasure to present my first annual report as the Chief of Markham Fire and Emergency Services to Council, residents and staff.

Markham Fire and Emergency Services (MFES) have undergone significant change during 2009 including the appointments of myself as Fire Chief in April and Phil

Alexander and Dave Decker as Deputy Fire Chiefs in July.

A recruitment process was completed and 15 new recruits joined the department in September to replace vacancies due to retirements. An additional 26 will commence employment in March 2010 to staff the Cathedral Fire Station (Station 93) and replace retirees.

Construction of Station 93 located at Major MacKenzie and Woodbine in the Cathedral area commenced in October and it is anticipated this station will be operational by July 2010. The station will be the first building constructed by the Town of Markham to achieve the "LEED" (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) gold standard certification. Special "Thanks" to our partners in Asset Management for their commitment to completing this project.

Our focus on the Education of our diverse community was enhanced this year with the launch of a partnership with Fairchild Radio, a popular station with the Chinese-Canadian community. Our staff co-hosted a 1.5 hour "phone in" radio program for 8 weeks with Fairchild staff. It is estimated that the audience the show reaches exceeds 250,000 people. This, and other similar activities, are central to MFES community engagement goals.

I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge the retirement of Firefighter Bill Vliek who is the last of the original firefighters hired in 1971 to provide fulltime fire service in the Town. On behalf of all staff, I wish him an enjoyable retirement and would like to thank him for his 38 years of service.

With the continued support of Council, the strong leadership of Commissioner Librecz and the continued dedication of all Markham Fire and Emergency Services personnel, MFES will continue to provide excellent Educational, Preventative and Emergency Services to the residents and visitors of our community and continue to make Markham a safe Town to live, work, and play.

The Support Services Divisions of the Markham Fire and **Emergency Services include** the Fire Prevention and Public Education, Communications and Training Divisions. Additionally, we oversee the Emergency Management Plan for the Town. In addition to the many public safety programs that are administered daily by the dedicated staff in these divisions, our people are leaders in many interdepartmental programs throughout the Town.

In May, our Emergency Management Team organized Markham's first full scale live exercise of an Emergency Reception Centre in the Milliken Mills Community Centre. Our staff partnered with Recreational Services and By-law staff, Red Cross, Salvation Army and local amateur radio operators among others to provide an evacuation centre for displaced residents.

For 8 weeks in the fall, 8100 Warden Avenue was transformed into a H1N1 vaccination centre with the help of Capital Assets and Operations personnel. Beginning in 2009, Markham received Federal/Provincial infrastructure funding to re-organize the Emergency Operations Centre.

As part of our ongoing commitment to exceeding our customer service goals, we are continually reviewing our procedures and delivery models. In 2009, we have completed the installation of the self-contained breathing apparatus maintenance facility in our Wismer Station. We have now consolidated all of our maintenance, testing and repair of our breathing apparatus into a single clean, secure facility. A number of our suppression staff are certified breathing air technicians.

The fleet standardization and bunker gear procurement plans were extended for additional periods starting in 2009. Both of these projects originated from staff committees and have lead to significant operational efficiencies. In 2009, we took delivery of an air/light vehicle. This apparatus is equipped with a mobile breathing air system which has lead to future capital savings in our upcoming stations. Speaking of new stations, construction of the Cathedral fire station began in July. Cathedral is a LEED energy efficient building which will serve as a model to compare with our traditionally built stations. Planning and design for the Cornell station is now well underway.

In 2009, mobile computing tablets were provided to our Fire Prevention staff. Now, our inspectors can access property and inspection information

remotely from their vehicles so they can provide even more timely responses to customer service requests. Our firefighting apparatus has been equipped with AVL/GPS technology in 2009; in 2010 we anticipate being able to provide immediate satellite location responses as well as digital pre-plan and property hazard information in real time. These are continuing projects with our partners in Fleet and Information Technology.

Our annual life cycle capital equipment and property review continues in conjunction with help from the Asset Management and Finance Departments. This forms part of our commitment to ensure that we continue "providing the highest level of life safety and property protection to those who live, work or play in our community."

SUPPRESSION DIVISION

he Suppression Division responded to 7676 emergency incidents during 2009. Each of the nine front run Suppression Division apparatus respond to an average of 1381 incidents resulting in 14,326 vehicle movements.

Of the 223 reported fires only 21 exceeded \$50,000.00 in damage. Medical emergencies continue to be the major response demand for MFES. Motor vehicle collisions continue to be a high demand response and to improve service delivery MFES added hydraulic rescue tools to Engine 921. The provision of the hydraulic rescue tools resulted in a reduction

in responses for Ladder 916 thus improving its availability and lowering operating and maintenance costs.

There are fire prevention and public education demands on the Suppression Division almost daily that include fund raising activities, festivals and street parties as well as school based educational and smoke alarm programs.

During mid 2009 construction began on Station 93 Cathedral (Woodbine and Major MacKenzie). This station will open in mid 2010 and will serve the North/West area of Markham.

COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION

he Communications Division handled over 63,500 incoming and outgoing telephone calls to assist Town of Markham and Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville customers with emergency and nonemergency service requests in 2009.

A total of 8,458 emergency and non-emergency responses were generated and managed by the Communications Division... 7,666 for the Town of Markham and 792 for the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville.

Dispatch Supervisor Mike Gottlieb earned certification as an "ENP" (Emergency Number Professional) by the National Emergency Number Association (NENA). He is one of only 16 people in Canada to have achieved that designation.

In 2009, there was one night that really challenged the Communications Division. On Saturday April 25, 2009, a severe storm went through the Town of Markham, which created a large volume of incoming telephone calls and the generation of more than five times the normal number of Incidents during the Night Shift. Call-Taker Neil Webb handled approximately 370 incoming and outgoing telephone calls and assisted Dispatcher Mike Gottlieb in the handling of 83 Incidents in the Town of Markham and the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, approximately

half of which occurred during the first two hours of the shift. Neil Webb is receiving the "Call-Taker of the Year – Fire" from the Tri-Services Communicators of York Region for his work during that evening.

The Communications Division teams maintained a more than acceptable average Incident processing time of 34 seconds... about half of the amount of time deemed to be acceptable by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standard for that process.

MECHANICAL DIVISION

At the end of 2009 Firefighter William Vliek retired after 38 years of service. Bill is the last of the twelve original Markham firefighters hired in 1971.

he Mechanical Division is responsible for maintenance and repair of the MFES fleet which includes suppression apparatus, fire prevention, education, mechanical and training vehicles as well as three trailers.

This Division is managed by Corporate Manager of Fleet and Supplies Laurie Canning and is located at 555 Miller Ave. Mechanics Paul Saunders, Kelly Pickering are assisted by Bill Vliek in the day to day maintenance and repair of vehicles, hydraulic tools, pumps, ladders, hose and small engines as well as fire fighting equipment.

Each suppression fire apparatus average 588 hours of run time and required an average of 38 hours of preventative maintenance and inspection. The average number of repair and nonscheduled maintenance hours for each suppression apparatus was 122.

During 2009 the Mechanical Division assisted with the design and purchase of a new Air/Light truck and a trailer for Hazardous Materials response. It is anticipated that these units will be placed into service by the second quarter of 2010. Also, during 2009 two additional pumper trucks have been ordered.

Mechanics received training to operate new scaffolding which will assist mechanics with repairs and maintenance at heights exceeding 3 meters in a safe and efficient manner.

To reduce fleet operating costs the life cycle replacement of the fire departments four hybrid vehicles has been extended for one year.

FIRE PREVENTION AND EDUCATION DIVISION

"Achieve an acceptable level of safety for the community by providing the citizens with the information necessary..."

he Town of Markham Fire and Emergency Services is committed to providing a fire safe environment for the citizens of Markham, by addressing fire risks in the Town and reducing fire losses. Fire Prevention activities are critical to the Department achieving its fire safety goals.

The primary activities of the Fire Prevention Division are Ontario Fire Code inspections and enforcement, and public fire safety education. Because residential fires account for the majority of fire dollar losses and fire fatalities, most of the Department's fire safety initiatives are targeted at our residents.

Fire Services strives to ensure that property owners are educated in fire safety, act responsibly and actively maintain their buildings, and not wait for fire prevention officers to identify their deficiencies. This is accomplished by assessing Code compliance and enforcing the legislation.

Construction and major renovation of buildings are regulated by the Ontario Building Code. However there is a need to have Fire Services involved in the process to ensure that the fire safety features required for the building are provided. Fire Prevention Division Plans Examiners act in an advisory capacity to the Towns Building Services Division, identifying violations or deficiencies to Building Department for appropriate follow up action.

The following goal applies to an effective public safety education program:

Achieve an acceptable level of safety for the community by providing the citizens with the information necessary for them to reduce the occurrence of fire, reduce the impact of fire and ensure their safety in the event of fire.

Public safety education is a necessary component of an effective fire prevention strategy. Assuring appropriate behaviour of building owners and occupants is essential to reduce the fire losses in the community

Public Education

This year the fire prevention division along with the fire suppression division reached a significant number of residents in 2009. The fire suppression division attended 172 community events which included school visits, street parties, fairs and festivals. The fire prevention division attended 135 community events which included presentations, training, fairs, school visits to name a few. The combined division reached 245,273 residents in 2009. Additionally, the prevention division took advantage of the relationships we had formed with local media and through the use of TV programs, newspaper and radio shows we reached a total of 2 million people on a global scale. This was a great year for outreach to our community and we continue to look for different and more creative ways to get the message of fire safety education out to our residents.

Fairchild Radio

In 2009 we created a partnership with Fairchild radio. Adam and Paul attended the radio station every Tuesday at 2:30 pm on their variety show called 2 PM BMW. We had an agreement for 8 shows from April 14, 2009 – June 2, 2009. We covered a wide range of fire safety topics from home fire safety to accessory apartments. This radio show is one of the largest Chinese radio programs in North America. The show attracts 250,000 listeners every week during the 1.5 hour show. We also arranged to have one of our firefighters Howie Tse on a Fairchild TV program in May 2009. This was a great partnership that will be continued in 2010.

Fairchild Open House

On July 14, 2009 station 98 hosted the first live radio show broadcast in Markham Fire history. The show focused on the fire services and what we do in the community. The open house consisted of the smoke house, fire hose target practice, fire hall tour, fire truck inspection and a game of fire safety jeopardy. We were able to host 500 people in a 3 hour time frame as well as provide all attendees with pamphlets and promotional material in both English and Chinese.

Fire Prevention Week

This year we wanted to ensure that all residents, businesses and schools in Markham were able to, not only receive information, but be able to attend an event with their family. This year we provided a number of different activities throughout the week. We delivered numerous fire extinguisher training sessions for businesses, prepared and circulated a fire safety display throughout the Town, and used the fire safety trailer at 4 different schools providing home fire safety education to 2400 students as well as providing each student with an information pamphlet to take home to their parents. Additionally, we had an open house at Station 94 on Birchmount Rd. As part of the open house we brought in a car for an auto-extrication demonstration. which is something the public don't get to see every day! We also used our new live fire extinguisher training unit to provide training to all parents who attended the open house.

Markham Fair

Safety Land was very interactive this year with our Junior Firefighter combat challenge. We were able to purchase junior firefighter uniforms for this event so that the experience was a bit more real for the children. We also used our fire safety trailer which is always a huge draw for families and children. We provided fire safety material to each person who attended Safety Land. We also included two information tents, so that parents who just wanted to do some reading on their own or discuss fire safety with a Fire Prevention Officer had the opportunity to get information without participating in any of the events. Safety Land also included a partnership with Power Stream. This partnership allows Safety Land to provide electrical safety tips as well.

State Farm Junior Firefighter Recruit Day

Every year the Markham Fire and Emergency Services (MFES) launch a Junior Firefighter Recruit Day. The contest has always consisted of 1 winner from the entire Town of Markham elementary schools (70 in total). This year MFES was able to create a State Farm Junior Firefighter Recruit Day on June 10, 2009, with a winner from every school in the Town.

Grade 6 students were asked to create a fire safety poster and a winner was selected from each school. What this did was get the interest of fire safety back in the schools. The students were

given 2 months to complete the poster and several teachers indicated that a lot of research was preformed by the students who worked on it at home. Additionally, we were informed that about half of our schools used this contest as part of their art project for the grade 6's. Not only did we have the children at home doing research and thinking about fire safety, we had the teachers incorporate fire safety into the art curriculum.

The Firefighter Recruit Day itself was a huge success. We had over 70 grade 6 students from across the Town. We had 40 parents, 14 staff, and 10 high schools students acting as "Captains" of each fire crew. The interactive State Farm Junior Firefighter Recruit Day featured training in all aspects of fire fighting including search and rescue; combat challenge; fire extinguisher training; fire safety house training; water rescue and fire truck inspection. In addition to the excitement that was created it also drew a lot of media exposure.

We had Tom Brown from CTV news broadcast live from the event. We respectfully recognized State

Farm, on National Television, for their support and commitment to Fire & Life Safety with the Town of Markham. We also had local media such as Rogers and the Economist & Sun provide coverage of the event.

Junior Fire Chief

Anson Lee, of All Saints Catholic School, was this year's winner of the Markham Junior Fire Chief contest. The contest was sent out to the Grade 4 classes in all elementary schools. The contest required each student to create a fire safety poster outlining a strong fire safety message. We received 100's of entries and Anson's poster was the winner, which depicted preventing fire from spreading, calling 911 and stop, drop and roll when clothing catches fire.

Anson spent the day on Friday November 20, 2009 as the Fire Chief. He sat in Chief Snowball's office and answered phone calls for the first part of the morning. He was then taken around to a number of stations for a visit and inspection. He also met with Commissioner Librecz and discussed his demands as the new Fire Chief!

Anson had a great day and we were happy to have him as Fire Chief for the day.

York Region Junior **Firefighter**

Our Junior Fire Fighter program in conjunction with the seven other Fire Services in York Region continues to be a success. All grade three students are eligible to participate by writing a one

page story or drawing a poster about how they will be incorporating safety into their activities during the summer. Three of the Risk Watch safety/injury components must be used in their story.

Markham had over 300 entries submitted into the contest, with Aun Hussain from Ellen Fairclough Public School being chosen as Markham's winner. The day was hosted by King City Fire Services at their Schomberg Fire Station. The day consisted rolling up a hose, hitting a target with water, search and rescue training, portable fire extinguisher training and bucket race.

Burn Cell and Auto Extrication Demonstration

Milliken Mills High School in partnership with MFES Public Education and the duty crew from station 95 conducted a burn cell and auto extrication demonstration on June 2 to the Grade 12 students. The burn cell which is an 8'x8'x8' room is outfitted to simulate a students dorm room. The program discusses the importance of fire safety in off campus living as well as dorm rooms within the school. A waste paper basket is lit on fire to simulate a cigarette being dropped and then allowed to burn until flashover occurs. The goal is to impress upon the students the speed at which fire can spread and that being prepared is most important.

Arrahman Arrheem Network

In September of 2009 Markham Fire & Emergency Services was approached by Arrahman Arraheem Network to conduct a documentary on the Fire Service. Over the next month and half a film crew conducted interviews. taping of fire fighters conducting daily activities and the training of a new recruit class. The goal of the program is to promote awareness of the fire service and fire fighting in general to Pakistan and other East Asian countries. Once completed the program will be offered to the public television as a introduction to Markham Fire & Emergency Services and firefighting.

TRAINING DIVISION

he Training Division's Training Officers work with certified On-Shift Instructors, other fire services, educational institutions, and Fire Service staff to achieve our goal to facilitate the advancement of knowledge, skills and attitude of fire staff.

In 2009 approximately 24,000 hours of training were logged through the delivery of new training programs along with the quarterly maintenance training requirements.

Training accomplishments for 2009 include:

Recruit Training

This was the first recruit class to attend the newly constructed Richmond Hill Fire Department propane powered training tower. The tower was utilized to simulate fire ground operational skills that were taught during previous training exercise. Training in Richmond Hill included, fire rescue and survival techniques, ladder operations, hose deployment, hydrant operations and equipment hoisting using ropes.

The training also included a three week Emergency Medical Responder certification component.

Acquired Structure Training

Annual acquired structure training took place at 10295 Ninth Line. The house owned by Transport Canada as part of the federal airport lands and leased to the Town of Markham for the purpose of practical scenario based training.

The training consisted of two fire service apparatus and one Chief Officer for each evolution. Training Officer Mike Stevens lead the Training Officers in the practical training sessions over a period of six weeks.

Promotional Processes

Several promotional processes were conducted by the Training Division in 2009 including a Designate Captain's promotional process with twenty successful candidates being eligible for promotion. First Class Suppression

Firefighters with a minimum of eight years of service with Markham Fire and Emergency Services are eligible for promotion to Designate Captain. The process consists of a written examination, practical evaluation, and a performance assessment.

Firefighter reclassification exams were conducted promoting seven firefighters to the rank of First Class Firefighter.

A Training Officer promotional process was also conducted, promoting firefighter Glenn Ambrose to the position of Training Officer.

Emergency Medical Responder/Defibrillation

Training Officer Don Kennedy leads the team of Emergency Medical Responder (EMR) instructors that includes, firefighters Stuart Hart, Steve Morrow, Katie Sonnichsen, Rob Garland, Steven Romanowitch, Don Sutherland, Wayne Hoover, Dan Makort and Nicole Egan.

CPR/AED recertification for all suppression staff was conducted in the third quarter of this year.

Summative testing began this year in order to certify all suppression staff as Emergency Medical Responders. The EMR certification designation is near completion.

The EMR team was also responsible for delivery of the three week EMR recruit training.

Ice/Water Rescue

In conjunction with the Coordinator, On – Shift Ice/Water Instructors conducted practical Ice/Water Rescue training scenarios as well as pool training and shore based operations. All suppression staff participated in a practical session with the new Salus Water Rescue Personal Floatation Devices.

Training Officer Don Kennedy is the Ice/Water Rescue Coordinator for the On-shift instructors that include firefighters Julia Sprawson, Quinn Colin, Marc Van Loon, and Mike Hallyburton.

Firefighter Survival

Suppression staff conducted practical Survival Techniques sessions. The sessions included Rapid Intervention Crew operations, rescue kit and May-Day communications.

Driver/Operator Training

All the Fire Service's driver/operators were evaluated for their knowledge and understanding of air brake systems as per Ministry of Transportation requirements.

In addition road safety practices and the commitment to apparatus and member's safety remains a priority within the Fire Service. Apparatus evaluations to qualify firefighters to become drive/operators of our apparatus were conducted by Training Officer Clint Frotten in 2009.

Accessible Customer Service Training

In 2008, the Government of Ontario launched the accessible customer service standard under the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act. Its goal is to ensure that people with disabilities get the same level


- Air side communications

- Fire rescue tactics


These accomplishments not only reflect the need to stay current with the existing programs but they also incorporate the changing needs, quality assurance, operational standards and guidelines within the Fire Service.








Injury Count by Case Type - Total Injuries: 28


