Item	Discussion	Action
<b>1. Call to Order</b>	The Animal Care Committee convened at 5:35 p.m. with Janet Andrew presiding as Chair.	
<b>2. Presentation on Banning Circuses</b>	Rob Laidlaw, Executive Director, Campaigning for the Protection of Wild Animals, and Camile Labchuk, Director of Legal Advocacy, Animal Justice presented their research on banning circuses with animals.  In the world the recent trend has been to move away from circuses with animals. Some of the reasons for this movement against animals in circus can be contributed to the following: (1) the lack of space circus animals are provided with; (2) the lack of exercise and restriction to the natural behaviour imposed on circus animals; (3) the physical abuse of circus animals; (4) the use of threat based management to control circus animals; (5) the lack of safety standards when showcasing wild animals in comparison to a zoo.	Some of the Countries recently to ban animals in circuses include: Denmark; Finland; Chile; Peru; Ecuador; Hungary; and Brazil. In Canada, the provinces of British Columbia and Nova Scotia have regulated the use of animals in circuses. Furthermore, the City of Winnipeg prohibits any circuses or performances with wildlife. It achieved this by amending its Animal Control By-law.  There was a discussion on a court decision regarding the City of Windsor that tried to ban animals in circuses by passing a by-law. The by-law was passed to protect the public welfare and was overturned by the courts. It was the legal opinion of the presenter that the by-law may have

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	<p>been upheld if it was passed to protect animal welfare. Another reason the judge overturned the by-law was because residents who wanted to go to circuses were not consulted.</p> <p>Municipalities that are planning to ban or regulate animals in circuses should: (1) be well prepared prior to presenting their proposal to Council; (2) have a well drafted by-law; (3) give the other sides a chance to be heard.</p> <p>It was the presenters' legal opinion that municipalities have the authority to ban circuses. They can do so by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Banning all animal performances and circuses (done by the Winnipeg, Cobourg, and Sault Ste Marie) – easiest to enforce</li><li>• Set very high standards for circuses (done by Nova Scotia and British Columbia) – enforcement can be onerous</li><li>• Ban certain practices that circuses use (done by Los Angeles) – this makes it very difficult for circuses to come to town, as they need to use tools that inflict pain to control the animals.</li></ul> <p>It was questioned what type of animal performances the City of Winnipeg banned. An example of the types of performances banned, include acts that go to birthday parties and fairs with exotic animals being showcased to the public. One of the reasons for the ban is because these types of acts typically have much lower safety standards than a zoo.</p> <p>There was also a discussion on the possibility of spreading disease from animal to humans or vice versa.</p>
