CEPAS provides dinical assessments to determine eligibility for the program; intervention thervention (IBI) services to children under the age of 6 who have been diagnosed as having an Autism Spectrum Disorder and who programs for children exiting the CEPAS program; parenties, assistance with transition to schools/other workshops and access to a lending library; and access to an on-line parent support group.

Kinark operates child care centres in 6 locations in the Northern section of York Region. Over 300 spaces are ovailable, providing care for children aged 18 months to 12 years in services that include Nursery, Kindergarten and Before & After Programs.

SUPERVISED ACCESS CENTRES



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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The faith and trust that is put in us by our clients and families is a huge responsibility.

When in crisis, parents and caregivers, children and youth need to find someone, somewhere who believes in them - believes in the strength of their family and believes that with some work things can and will get better.

This year was full of challenge, full of change, full of chances and full of achievement.

Typically in year-end messages like this we review highlights of the year's activities and then express thanks to staff at the end of the report. For this year in particular, our thanks to staff must come as the first item of business because you cannot note the highlights of the past year at Kinark without noting the exceptional contribution of our staff.

In what has been one of Kinark's most demanding years, our staff have demonstrated a level of commitment, teamwork and professionalism that we want to acknowledge. Kinark's team of front line child and youth workers, supervisors, child care workers, administrative support staff, outdoor educators, psychologists, maintenance staff, managers, social workers, cooks, nurses, consultants, volunteer coordinators, therapists is just that - a team. To all of our team we say: You are what sets Kinark apart. You sacrifice - you say yes when it would be easier to say no - you lead - you set the example - you listen - you push - you keep on going when others would give up - you make a difference.

Last year about now, we had just been given the official word that for the first time in almost a decade, the government would be increasing base budgets of children's mental health agencies by three per cent. A concerted advocacy effort from the network of children's mental health agencies was coupled with the keen insight into the crisis in the sector by the Minister of Children and Youth Services, Dr. Marie Bountrogianni. These combined forces contributed to the budget announcement of this long-awaited base funding increase. Also announced by the Minister were plans to make additional funding available to

communities for local priorities. To start the process the ministry called upon service providers to undertake an intensive process of cross-sectoral planning. Kinark, its Board and our Provincial Management Team were active participants with our colleagues in all of our service areas. The strong mutually-respectful relationships we had already forged within our service regions allowed us to get down to the business at hand quickly and effectively. Our goal was to submit comprehensive plans to the Ministry with the vision of making the system easier for families to access, ensuring that services were client-centred and ultimately finding better and more cost-effective ways of meeting the individual needs of each child and family.

Despite the new funding opportunities, we continue to face the reality that when families in crisis call us, desperate for support, we cannot give them the immediate service they need. In fact, we often have to tell these families that they will have to wait months before we can offer any kind of ongoing programming. Not days, not weeks, but months. This is not acceptable. Populations are expanding rapidly in many of our service areas. Children and youth are presenting with more intense and more complex needs than ever before. As more and more community partners look to children's mental health agencies like Kinark for support of children and youth showing signs of extreme social, emotional and behavioural difficulties, children's mental health must remain as a priority on the list of funding needs for the government.

The government has also begun the task of examining the previously-neglected area of policy development in the Children's Mental Health sector. Children's Mental Health Ontario has played a key role in getting this critical item on the Ministry's already busy agenda and has sought input from its members throughout the province. We applaud the Ministry for this undertaking. While a daunting task, it is a necessary one if we are to move forward and look progressively at the system. We use evidence-based practice in our clinical work, we need to ensure that we use similar mindsets when talking about policy development and systemic change.

A number of new programs have been implemented over the past year. The Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) School Support Program is one of the initiatives recently implemented by the government to support school-aged children on the Autism Spectrum. Kinark now operates the ASD-SSP in the Central East region. The purpose of the program is to provide consultation to teaching staff and school board personnel in order to strengthen services to children and youth with an Autism Spectrum Disorder. The program is a huge but important undertaking. Eleven Boards of Education. including 2 Francophone Boards, together comprising over 2300 primary and secondary schools fall in our region. Since the announcement of the program last Spring, Kinark has hired and trained close to its full staffing complement, who are now working collaboratively with school personnel and other school-based special education professionals to ensure that each student's learning potential is maximized.

With funding from the Department of Canadian Heritage, Kinark hired an agency Diversity Coordinator to assist the Board and Provincial Management in its development of comprehensive policies and practices with a goal of ensuring we meet the highest standards of racial and cultural sensitivity at all levels of the organization - with clients and families, staff, and Board representation.

Recently, the Ministry of Children and Youth Services awarded Kinark funding to develop a pilot program called the Intensive Support and Supervision Program (ISSP). Together with our project partner, Associated Youth Services of Peel, the goal of the program is to support youth who have committed an offence but due to extreme mental health issues would be extremely vulnerable in a custodial setting. The contract for services covers the central region of the province, excluding Toronto, and will involve partnerships with a wide array of service providers. Simply put, ISSP is an intensive program for some of our highest needs children and youth.

Triple P (Positive Parenting Program) is another evidence-based initiative that is being added to the Kinark services menu. Piloted in our York and Simcoe Program areas, Triple P is a unique, multilevel family intervention program for the prevention and treatment of behavioural and emotional problems in children and youth by enhancing the knowledge, skills and confidence of everyone in the community. Triple P is one of the few evidence-based parenting programs available worldwide, founded on over 25 years of clinical and empirical research. Selected staff have already undergone an intensive 'train-the-trainer' program along with colleagues from various other services agencies across York Region and Simcoe County. You can read more details about Triple P in the service descriptions section later on in this report.

A number of exciting new programs have been initiated at Kinark's Outdoor Centre to serve the more vulnerable populations of children and youth. In its first year of operation, registration for the Summer Autism Quest Program is almost full and family respite weekends for families with children on the autism spectrum are also close to maximum capacity. With the surge in the school system's call to deliver character education programs, Kinark's already established Caring Classroom program, run as an outreach initiative of the Outdoor Centre had its busiest year ever with 32 programs.

With the support of Greenshields and the Imperial Oil Charitable Foundation, our goal of implementing a Volunteer Respite Program in York and Simcoe has been realized. Active recruitment, training and matching of volunteer special friends and host families has begun. The respite program is a welcome addition to the range of services offered in York Region and Simcoe County and marks a significant milestone in the ongoing growth of our volunteer program.

All programs benefit from the positive impact of Kinark's network of volunteers. Particularly in today's world as our lives run at unimaginable pace, we must acknowledge our gratitude to our special friends and drivers, our committee members and host families, our COPE and bingo volunteers for their time, their energy and their commitment to making a difference.

The Board and its various Committees and Task Forces continue in their progressive work on setting priorities and direction for the agency. Our Board/Management Retreat focused on Kinark's role as a children's mental health agency in establishing cross-sectoral partnerships to better service the needs of children and families. We were joined by experts in the areas of Education, Child Welfare, Youth Justice and Autism and set a course for action for the coming year in each of these four key service areas. Plans for the establishment of the Kinark Foundation are underway to assist us in diversifying our revenue base to support innovations and augment current programs where government support falls short of need. Additionally, a Task Force has been struck to examine social entrepreneurial initiatives for Kinark. Social entrepreneurial activities have a "double bottom line" - helping with revenue generation but also helping us to achieve our mission. Social entrepreneurial initiatives will be win-win-win venture for clients, for Kinark and for our communities.

This year, we say farewell to two retiring Board members. Roland Rutland has stepped down from the Board to assume his new role as the agency's Diversity Coordinator. As a volunteer, Roland helped to guide the agency through the initial stages of development of our diversity initiatives. He was and remains a keen advocate for children and families in Durham region.

In what he describes as one of the most difficult decisions he has had to make, long-standing Board member Earl Paquette has also chosen to step down from the Board at the end of this year. Earl has the energy and exuberance of a teenager and a fierce compassion for children and youth. He has been a tremendous asset to the Board and its Committees, in particular the Advocacy and Clinical, Quality Assurance Committees. He is a tremendous supporter of the Krista Sepp Awards and the loudest cheerleader at the Syl Apps Holiday Talent Show. But perhaps Earl's greatest gift to Kinark has been his support of staff - front line, management, and provincial management. His departure from the Board will leave a void at Kinark that will be difficult to fill. We thank both Roland and Earl for their unique contributions to the Agency.

It remains an impossible task to sum up a year's worth of activity at Kinark in these few brief paragraphs. Our continued thanks go to the Ministry and in particular our Program Supervisors who are an invaluable resource to us in our day to day operations. Gratitude again, to the multitude of volunteers who add so much to the vibrancy of the agency and the successful treatment outcomes of our clients and families.

A note of sincere thanks to those staff, volunteers and clients who lent their creativity to 'liven-up' the words and numbers that appear in this year end report.

And - thanks again to our staff. Truly, the best in the business!

DID YOU KNOW?

One in five Ontarians under 19 has a mental health disorder.

Of these 530,000 children, 300,000 have more than one disorder.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS

FAMILY SERVICES

Within all of our program areas, a range of treatment services that includes individual, family and group counseling is provided to children and their families within local communities. These kinds of services are provided to children who are living at home or youth living on their own in their communities, as well as to children who are in residential care.

CRISIS/INTENSIVE SERVICES

This category of specialized treatment services includes:

MULTI-SYSTEMIC THERAPY (MST)

This evidence-based program works intensively with children and youth with extremely complex emotional, social and behavioural needs. Using a set of 9 key principles, MST encompasses all aspects of a child's life to assist them in addressing their specific needs and to be more responsible for their actions. The involvement of everyone in the life of the child/youth in question – families, peers, school personnel, community members – all play integral roles in the successful delivery of the program. MST is delivered within the home and local communities.

FAMILIES FIRSTIM

This program delivers intensive, short-term services to families within their own homes. Often referred to as the 'family preservation program', Families FirstTM helps families learn new skills and problem solving techniques needed to allow the child/youth to remain in the home and prevent more costly out-of-home placement and potential family breakdown.

CRISIS SERVICES

These are programs that are supported by funding from the Ministry of Children & Youth Services and provided in collaboration with other agencies in local communities. Specifically, Kinark provides crisis response to children and families in York, Simcoe, Peterborough and Durham; and intensive family support to children with chronic mental health problems in York and Durham Regions as well as Northumberland County.

RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT

Children and youth in residential treatment are placed in a home-like setting within a community. Child and Youth Workers, supported by other experienced professionals and clinicians, provide children's daily care and facilitate individual plans of care. Wherever possible, parents/guardians join staff and children at mealtimes, during bedtime routines, during quiet and fun times, to ensure that these relationships are maintained and fostered, thereby facilitating reintegration into the home.

EDUCATION/DAY TREATMENT

Kinark, in collaboration with local Boards of Education, offers education/day treatment in selected program areas. This service addresses the needs of children that cannot be met in the regular school system. The goal of the program is to reintegrate children into the community school or a suitable alternative as quickly and as appropriately as possible.

LIFT (LIFE SKILLS AND INDEPENDENCE FOR TEENS)

LIFT is a program offered to teens aged 13-19 in Kinark's Simcoe program and provides a supportive environment for young people to assist them with their transition towards independence. Information and skill training is offered in a number of areas including: budgeting, personal hygiene, job readiness, problem solving, nutrition, anger management and communication.

STRIVE (SUPPORTING TEENAGERS IN READINESS FOR INDEPENDENCE, VOCATION AND EDUCATION)

STRIVE is designed to give youth who exhibit significant behavioural, social, or emotional difficulties skills training in order that they might succeed in mainstream educational or vocational settings. Offered in the Peterborough program STRIVE provides a range of services including: community outreach, crisis intervention, one-to-one life skills instruction, and group programs for those at risk of depression and suicide.

CHILD CARE

Kinark provides child care in six locations in the northern sector of York Region. 308 total spaces are available providing care for children between the ages of 18 months and 12 years, in programs including Nursery School, Kindergarten and Before and After Programs.

SUPERVISED ACCESS SERVICES

In its 12th year of operation, Kinark's highly respected Supervised Access programs provide safe, neutral and accessible locations where children can be supported during visits with their parents who are involved in custody/access disputes. In partnership with the Government of Ontario and the Ministry of the Attorney General, Kinark operates Supervised Access Centres in Simcoe/Muskoka as well as in Peterborough, Northumberland, Victoria and Haliburton Counties. Kinark partners with Access for Parents and Children in Ontario (APCO) to provide administrative support for supervised access programs in Toronto.

THERAPEUTIC FAMILY CARE

In selected program areas, the Therapeutic Family Care service (formerly "Therapeutic Foster Care") places children and youth with trained Treatment Parents and their Families. TFC is designed for children and teens who require greater structure and intensity of services than can be provided in their family home and encourages the achievement of every child's full potential by providing a stable and nurturing alternative family environment. Treatment parents work as part of a team with Kinark professionals, along with the child/teen and the natural parents. Specific treatment plans for each young person are developed by the team and include permanent placement plans which, depending on the needs of the child/youth may result in a return to the natural family; long-term family care; adoption; or independent living.

0-6 PROGRAMS

Kinark remains involved in an array of new programs for young children and their families, often in collaboration with other agencies in the communities where we are located such as Early Years Centres. These programs include the evidence-based services of 'Incredible Years' and 'Right from the Start' as well as Therapeutic Day Nursery programs and Preschool Consultation Services.

RESPITE PROGRAMS

Kinark responded to a strong and consistent message from parents with children/youth in service and is one of the only children's mental health centers in Ontario to offer Respite Relief services to families with children who are experiencing serious emotional, social and behavioural problems. Respite services are critical for families who have a high needs child or youth at home and who want to keep their family unit intact and prevent more intrusive, costly, long-term, out-of-home placement. Within the program itself, there is a wide range of flexible respite options that are provided including; parent-to-parent counseling, in-home relief, weekly outings, and short-term out-of-home placements for children of families at critical moments of stress. Respite programs now operate in York Region, Simcoe County, Peterborough County, Durham Region and Northumberland County.



2005 marks the 20th year of operation of the Kinark Outdoor Centre and the scope of programs, and

services KOC offers continue to expand to meet the growing and diverse needs of Kinark clients, families, and current and prospective client groups. The Outdoor Centre and its exceptional program and operational staff bring year-round outdoor education, skill development and adventure-based programming to Kinark clients and their families. CEPAS parent training/respite programs were piloted last Fall and were well received by families, who for many had never experienced a family vacation. This summer, the KOC is gearing up for its first year of Autism Quest - providing weeklong residential camping experiences for children and youth on the Autism Spectrum, and will also continue to offer family respite weekends throughout the year. Outdoor Centre staff report that the four annual programs run with the Syl Apps

secure treatment youth are without question one of the 'favourites'. Other highlights of the past year include the delivery of 32 Caring Classroom programs in York, Simcoe, and Peterborough regions. The KOC's involvement with the Duke of Edinburgh program continues to grow with increased open enrollment, and custom school trips. Private school participation has developed substantially with groups from schools including Upper Canada College, Greenwood College School, Bayview Glen, Bethany Hills, and Appleby College taking part in experiential outdoor education initiatives. The Outdoor Centre is pleased to partner with special population agencies and organizations, such as BUCKO (Burn Camp for Kids in Ontario), About Face (supporting children with facial deformities). Operation Springboard (developmentally delayed youth), and Cambridge Respite Services - just to name few. The Kinark Outdoor Centre is very proudly, the largest provider of Adult Mental Health recreational/camp programming in Ontario.



The Krista Sepp Memorial Awards, held each year on February 3 pay tribute to the memory of a young child and youth worker who was

tragically murdered while on duty at one of Kinark's residential homes in Simcoe County. The Award is presented in two categories, the Horizon Award (recognizing promising work of CYW's in the field for 5 years and under) and the Mentoring Awards (recognizing the ongoing contributions of CYW's working in front-line positions for 6+ years). A record 44 nominations were received this year from across the province and from across many service sectors including children's mental health, child welfare, education and health. This year's award winners were Monica Hodgkiss (New Path Youth and

Family Service, Cookstown) - HORIZON AWARD and Helena Perera (Women in Crisis, Sault Ste. Marie) - MENTORING AWARD. Highlights of the Awards Cereinony included fervent words of support from Jessica Hill, Deputy Minister of the Ministry of Children and Youth Services, who along with several Ministry colleagues attended the ceremony to recognize the work of all CYW's in Ontario. Many nominees spoke passionately of their commitment to the field and to the children and youth they serve and recognized the memory of Krista in their words of thanks to those gathered. Kinark's own Denise MacDonald of the Durham Program was nominated for her outstanding work in the 0-6 field. 2006 marks the 15th Anniversary of the Awards and plans are underway among the Steering Committee for a gala celebration in memory and in honour of Krista and her family.



The Syl Apps Youth Centre (SAYC) operates two co-educational programs: secure treatment and youth

justice (secure detention and custody). The secure treatment program provides services to youth aged 12-18 who have severe and complex mental health issues and put themselves or others at serious risk of harm. Youth in this program are admitted through Family Courts across Ontario. Residents in the youth justice program range in age from 12-15 and are referred most often through youth courts in Halton, Peel and Dufferin with regular admittance from courts in Toronto and Simcoe Counties. The youth justice program also functions as a provicial resource for the placement of high-risk youth who require clinical support

and programming that other facilities are not able to provide. In addition to on-site educational programming provided by the Halton District School Board, SAYC offers over 20 different therapeutic programs and support groups based on the individual strengths and needs of each youth in care. All interventions are driven by extensive clinical assessments and developed from evidence-based best practices. Rehabilitation and treatment are the guiding principles of the work done by the multi-disciplinary professional staff at SAYC. This year, the youth at Syl Apps put on another tremendous holiday performance for families, staff, and Board to showcase their musical and creative talent and most recently the annual Powwow was held in celebration of hope, health, and mutual respect for all cultures and backgrounds.



The Central East Preschool Autism Service (CEPAS) provides quality intensive behavioural intervention (IBI) to children who have been diagnosed as having an autism

spectrum disorder and who meet the criteria for program eligibility under the Ministry's guidelines as well as providing transitional support services for clients who are phasing out of the CEPAS program and entering into other community or home-based services. The goal of the CEPAS program is to help children achieve their greatest level of independence. CEPAS offers two service options to families whose children are eligible for IBI services - the 'Regional Program' - a service option wherein clinical programs and related costs are provided through CEPAS and its partner agencies and the 'Direct Funding Option' that provides some funding to families who wish to contract with their own private provider. This year, Kinark welcomed Lake Ridge Community Support Services as a new service provider in the regional program. In an effort to more efficiently and effectively address the needs of some of our families and children in service, Kinark and its service partners now operate 6 centre-based programs. The sustained increase in

diagnoses of Ontario's children on the autism spectrum continues to mean long and frustrating waits for families across the province to receive IBI services. Current wait time for families averages approximately one year. Parent advocacy has assisted in bringing the immediate needs of these children to the attention of the government and this year, Kinark nominated Nancy Morrison, a parent advocate for the Child Welfare League of Canada's Award of Excellence in Advocacy in recognition for her successful and sustained efforts on behalf of all families affected by autism. Additional funding was provided by the government this year to speed up the clinical assessment processes for families to ensure that only children who met the criteria to access government supported IBI funding were placed on the wait list and those who would not have qualified were not waiting unnecessarily. The CEPAS clinial team led by Dr. Anne Cummings, played an instrumental role in the training and program start-up of the Autism Quest program and Family Respite Services at the Kinark Outdoor Centre. Kinark continues to partner with families and Ministry officials to examine service demands, funding formulae and staffing supports to address the needs of this vulnerable population.

Triple P (or the Positive Parenting Program) is a unique, multilevel family

intervention program for the prevention and treatment of behavioural and emotional problems in preadolescent children. Developed in Australia, Triple P is based on 25 years of research and assessment at the University of Queensland and is the latest in the range of Evidence-Based Practices to be offered at Kinark. In the Spring of 2004, a contingent of Kinark staff from our York and Simcoe programs participated in an intensive Train-the-Trainer model with colleagues from other children's service agencies in those regions. Triple P is a parenting and family support strategy that aims to prevent severe behavioural, emotional and developmental problems in children by enhancing the knowledge, skills and confidence of

parents. The program is based on the philosophy of self-regulation. The goals are for children to develop emotional self-regulation and for parents to become resourceful, independent problem-solvers. As families determine their own particular goals, the program is further tailored to suit their aspirations. Practitioners consult and guide clients through active skills training and parents decide what they wish to take on. Triple P's mottos is "small changes – big difference" and its various 'levels' are designed so that they can be adapted to meet the unique needs of each family. It has been proven to work effectively across a diversity of cultures, socio-economic demographics and family structures. Under the leadership of Dr. Brian Beech, Triple P will be piloted in York and Simcoe with future plans for roll-out across the agency.

School Support Program

The Kinark ASD School Support Program is one of the initiatives recently implemented by the Ontario Government to

support school-aged children on the Autism Spectrum. The purpose of the program is to provide consultation to teaching staff and school board personnel in order to strengthen services to children and youth with an Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) who are students in Ontario's publicly-funded school system. The program does not provide direct services to children and youth but rather aims

to enhance the knowledge and skills of school board staff for effective, evidence-based behavioural teaching strategies to support students in the classroom. The program also serves as a link between schools, Boards of Education and community-based service agencies regarding issues pertaining to students with an ASD. To-date the ASD-SSP staffing complement is made of up 25 frontline consultants who work closely with the over 2300 schools within 11 school board districts. Strong and mutually-respectful partnerships with school boards, school administration and existing special needs personnel have been the driving force behind the successful implementation of this important initiative.

ISSP

Recently, Kinark along with its collaborative partner Associated Youth Services of Peel was awarded a contract to

develop and deliver a pilot project called the Intensive Support and Supervision Program (ISSP) on behalf of the Ministry of Children and Youth Services. ISSP is specifically designed to serve youth who have been found guilty of an offence under the Youth Criminal Justice Act (YCJA) and who have a complex mental health and/or other special need(s). ISSP is targeted to serve those youth would be assessed as extremely vulnerable if placed in a custodial setting and who could in turn, be more appropriately supported and supervised in the community without jeopardizing public safety. Youth will be referred to the ISSP through a court-

ordered referral process and will undergo intensive clinical assessment to determine eligibility and service requirements. The ISSP program will be delivered by a multidisciplinary team from a collaborative group of service partners across Central Ontario, with the exception of the Central and North Toronto areas. Through its various treatment and support components, ISSP aims to more positively influence attitudes and behaviour and promote the development of appropriate social skills in the program participants. ISSP contains a range of crisis and on-going support services that will be tailored to meet the needs of individual youth and their families and include: augmented MST therapy, psychiatric consultation, residential stabilization, therapeutic outdoor education and respite services.



Nigel and Brandon, age 10, have been buddies since November 2003. Nigel is a police foundation student at Sir Sandford Fleming College in Peterborough and


