History of the Local Immigration Partnership (LIP) initiative

- A mechanism for local municipalities and community stakeholders to plan supports for newcomers in their communities.
- York Region is one of the approximately 45 LIP initiatives in Ontario funded by Citizenship and Immigration Canada.





Overview of Local Immigration Partnership Initiative

Deliverables:

- Establish a Community Partnership Council
- Develop an Immigration Settlement Strategy

Objectives:

- Improve access to and coordination of immigrant integration services
- □ Improve labour market outcomes
- Strengthen regional awareness and capacity to successfully integrate immigrants





Community Partnership Council (CPC)

- The Community Partnership Council (CPC) was appointed by Regional Council in Feb 2010 to help develop the Immigration Settlement Strategy.
- Members 24 sector representatives: settlement, education, labour market, health, Francophone community, social services, police services and local municipalities
- Co-chaired by Mayor Frank Scarpitti, Town of Markham and Stephen Lam, Catholic Community Services of York Region
- Markham representative: Sandra Tam, Senior Business Development Officer, Economic Development


Changing Demographics

- By 2031, 55% of York Region population will be immigrants.






Recent immigrants continue to be well-educated but often hold jobs that don't match their skills

Knowledge of official language impacts all aspects of integration




